SECOND SUPPLEMENTAL AFFIDAVIT OF STEVEN A. AVERY, SR.

Now comes your affiant, Steven A. Avery, Sr., and under oath hereby states as follows:

1. I am of legal majority and can truthfully and competently testify to the matters contained herein based upon my personal knowledge. The factual statements herein are true and correct to the best of my knowledge, information and belief. I am of sound mind and I am not taking any medication, nor have I ingested any alcohol that would impair my memory of the facts stated in this affidavit.

2. I have reviewed my Affidavit from November 23, 2016 (R. 604:22-30) and my Supplemental Affidavit from November 14, 2017 (R. 636:89-96), and I hereby incorporate them into this affidavit. (Attached and incorporated as **Exhibit C** are my previous affidavits).

3. I was aware that my sister Barb had a computer in her trailer. I was present one time when Barb turned on the computer which was in Bobby's room. Another woman, whom I did not know, was present at the time. At no time did I observe the computer to be located in the living room.



4. During the week, Bobby was the only person home at the Dassey residence between 6 a.m. and 3:45 p.m.

5. I never turned on Barb's computer and used her computer in any way. I did not have the password for the computer. On one occasion, I observed Blaine on the computer communicating with his girlfriend.

6. I had my own computer with internet service. There would be no reason that I would need to be on Barb's computer.

7. My computer was never used to do Google searches. My girlfriend, Jodi, and my sister, Barb, did Yahoo searches. I was present with my sister, Barb, who did a search of dating sites for my brother, Chuck, and for property. The only other searches were done by my girlfriend, Jodi. At no time were searches ever done on my computer for images of Teresa Halbach or images of violent pornography.

8. The only adult films I have ever viewed were on DirecTV. On my computer, the only nude photographs I had were ones uploaded by my girlfriend of her and me.

9. I believe that my nephew, Bobby Dassey ("Bobby") and Scott Tadych ("Tadych"), my sister's third husband, are involved in the murder of Teresa Halbach ("Ms. Halbach") for the following reasons:

- a. On the evening of November 3, 2005, after I left my mother's place, I stopped at my sister, Barb Dassey-Janda's ("Barb"), property and broke open a cut on the outside of the middle finger of my right hand as I was attempting to unhitch her trailer for her.
- b. I went into my Pontiac, parked on my driveway, to grab my phone charger. I dripped blood in my Pontiac on the gearshift and other places. Anyone who looked through the windows of my Pontiac could have seen the blood on the gearshift, and known there was a cut on my hand. I left my Pontiac unlocked.

- c. After reviewing police reports and thinking about the fact that Blaine Dassey (“Blaine”) went with Chuck Avery (“Chuck”) and me to Menards, I remembered that I went to Barb’s door to see if any of her sons wanted to go with me to Menards.
- d. Bobby and Blaine were home. I asked Bobby and Blaine if they wanted to go with me and my brother, Chuck, to Menards. I told both of them that a law enforcement officer had just left the property after asking me questions about Ms. Halbach’s visit to photograph Barb’s van on October 31, 2005. I noticed that Bobby was immediately nervous after I mentioned the visit by the officer. He said that he could not go with me to Menards and that he had “things to do.” There is no doubt in my mind that Bobby saw that my finger was bleeding. My memory is that Blaine said that he wanted to go to Menards and he went with Chuck and me.
- e. Prior to leaving for Menards, I returned to my trailer to put tape on my bleeding finger. I entered my trailer through the south door because it was closest to the bathroom. I did not lock the south door of my trailer after I entered through it. A large amount of blood dripped onto the rim and sink and the floor of the bathroom. I did not wash away or wipe up because Chuck was waiting for me to go to Menards in Manitowoc with him. I think I left somewhere between 7:15 and 7:30 p.m. I quickly wrapped my finger in duct tape and left the trailer to meet Chuck. I left through the front door of my trailer.
- f. While we were leaving Avery property, driving a flatbed to Menards in Manitowoc, I saw taillights in front of my trailer. The taillights were further apart and higher off the ground than sedan taillights. I told my brother, who was driving, about the taillights. We turned around and drove to my trailer, but the vehicle was gone.
- g. On November 4, I woke up at 6:00 a.m. and went into the bathroom to take a shower. I saw that most of the blood on my sink, which I had not cleaned up the previous night, was gone. It seemed to me that the blood had been cleaned up. After reviewing more case documents and thinking about what happened on November 3, 2005, I do not believe that law enforcement broke into my trailer and took blood from my sink and planted it in Ms. Halbach’s vehicle. I believe that Bobby removed the blood from my sink and planted it in the RAV-4. Law enforcement would not remove the blood from the sink because they would not know that the blood belonged to me and would believe that it belonged to Ms. Halbach. Only the killer would know that the blood did not belong to Ms. Halbach and only someone who saw my finger bleeding would know that the blood was mine, so, I think that the only person who was there and knew my finger was bleeding and could have gotten into my trailer was Bobby. He would have taken the blood to frame me and save himself. Bobby drove his Blazer to the front of my trailer and it was his Blazer taillights that I observed as Chuck

turned on STH 147. I do not believe that the vehicle could have come from any other location than the Dassey-Janda place because the vehicle was gone in the two minutes it took Chuck, Blaine, and I to return to my trailer. The vehicle had to already be on the property when we left, and Bobby's vehicle was the only vehicle that was present at the time we left. I believe that my trailer door was unlocked, but, even if it were locked, the Dasseys had a key to my trailer at their place.


- h. In my prior Supplemental Affidavit, at paragraphs 14-17, I stated that Bobby lied about leaving the Avery Salvage Yard ("ASY") **prior** to Ms. Halbach. As I have stated in my Supplemental Affidavit, Bobby left the ASY property immediately **after** Ms. Halbach in his black Blazer. (See R. 636:92, at ¶¶ 14-17). Bobby lied at trial when he testified for the State that he left the property before Ms. Halbach.
- i. I reviewed Bobby's November 17, 2017 interview with Special Investigator John Dederling ("Inv. Dederling") of the Calumet County Sheriff's Department. In the November 17, 2017 report, Bobby misrepresented the location of Ms. Halbach's vehicle when she was photographing Barb's van. Bobby misrepresented in his map that Ms. Halbach's car was parked east of Barb's van. In fact, Ms. Halbach's car was parked in such a position that Barb's van would have obstructed Bobby's view of at least part of Ms. Halbach's activities at the van and her walking towards my trailer. (Attached and incorporated as **Exhibit A** is a copy of my correction of the location of Ms. Halbach's vehicle in relation to Barb's van).
- j. As I have stated in my Supplemental Affidavit, Bobby commented to me every time Ms. Halbach visited the property, with words to the effect of "I see that your girlfriend was over yesterday." (See R. 636:89, at ¶ 2).
- k. Bobby misrepresented that he did not know Ms. Halbach was coming to take photographs on October 31, 2005. Current post-conviction counsel provided me with a copy of my cell phone records. Reviewing those records refreshed my recollection about the fact that I spoke to Bobby around 8:39 a.m. and told him to get the battery in the van charged because the photographer was coming to take pictures of the van. Current post-conviction counsel provided me with a transcript of my November 6, 2005 interview with Marinette County Sheriff's Department. After reading the transcript, my recollection was refreshed that I stopped by Barb's residence and talked to Bobby around 11 a.m. I specifically recall talking to Bobby about charging the van, and I believe that we actually tried to charge the van.
- l. In one of his first police interviews, Bobby said he had seen me, and not Ms. Halbach, walking back to my trailer which is true. I came out the door and walking to Ms. Halbach's vehicle to pay her on October

31, 2005. (See **Exhibit 3** attached and incorporated in the Motion to Supplement Previously Filed Motion for Post-Conviction Relief).

- m. While reviewing Bobby's report, it refreshed my recollection that I had seen Scott Tadych's vehicle at the Dassey residence prior to phone calls I made on behalf of my girlfriend Jodi Stachowski ("Jodi") to Madison, WI to inquire about the state of her appeal from a drunk driving charge. My current post-conviction attorneys provided me with my phone records, which document that I made five phone calls between 12:09 p.m. and 12:16 p.m. Three of the calls were to the Wisconsin Department of Health Services. Two of the calls were to the Wisconsin State Public Defender Appellate Office. Immediately prior to making the phone call at 12:09 p.m. on October 31, 2005, I went to my vehicle to retrieve paperwork about Jodi's case. When I got to my driveway, I looked up and I saw Mr. Tadych's vehicle parked directly behind Bobby's Blazer. (Attached and incorporated herein as **Exhibit B** is a copy of my cell phone records from October 30, 2005-October 31, 2005).
- n. I remember thinking it was strange that Mr. Tadych was at the Dassey residence when Barb was not home. I watched to see when he left, and to my best recollection, it was after about 15 minutes. Mr. Tadych lied at trial when he testified that he was visiting his mother the morning of October 31, 2005, at the Aurora Medical Center in Green Bay.
- o. Bobby misrepresented the comments that were made in a conversation between him, me, and Michael Osmunson ("Mike"). The conversation did not occur in the Dassey garage. The conversation was initiated by Bobby who asked me if I had Ms. Halbach's hidden somewhere. I thought he was joking, and stated "under my bed." I did not start this conversation. When I reviewed Bobby's recent interview, I thought it was suspicious that he was referring to Ms. Halbach as deceased since, at that point on November 4, 2005, everyone thought that she was missing and I did not know she had been murdered.


10. The fact that Bobby and Mr. Tadych lied so many times about the most important details of the case to the police and in their trial testimonies is the reason that I believe that both of them are involved in the murder of Ms. Halbach.

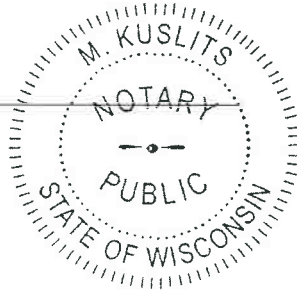

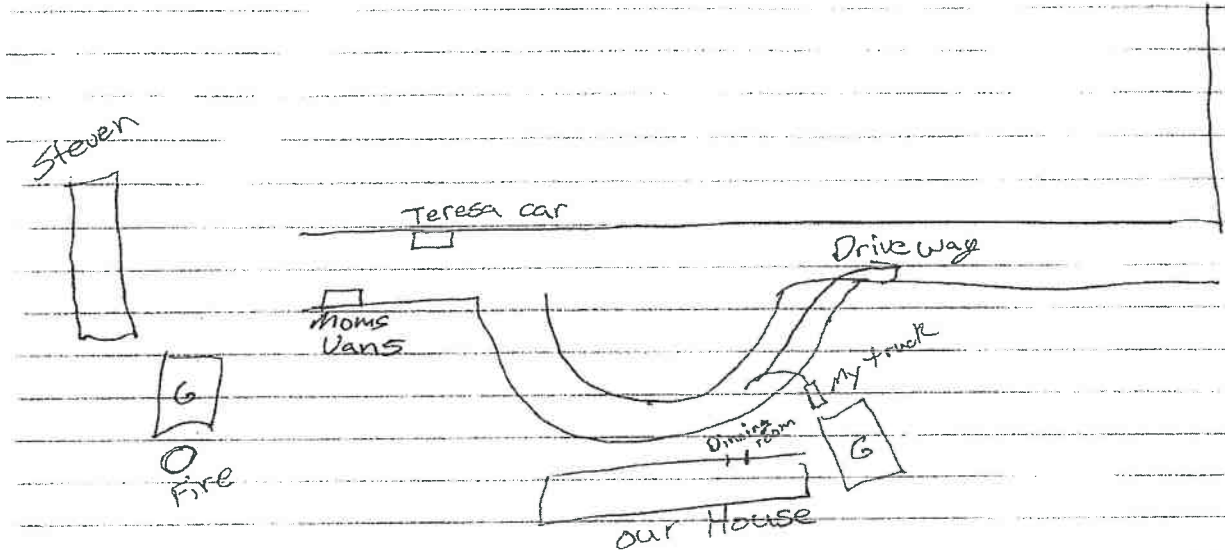

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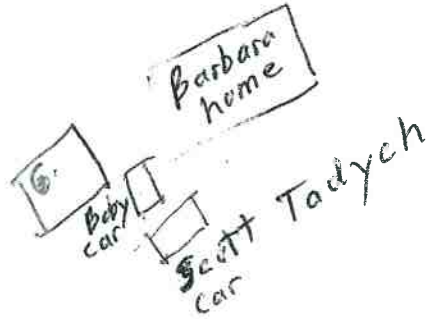

AFFIDAVIT OF STEVEN A. AVERY, SR.

Now comes your affiant, Steven A. Avery, Sr., and under oath hereby states as follows:

1. I am of legal majority and can truthfully and competently testify to the matters contained herein based upon my personal knowledge. The factual statements herein are true and correct to the best of my knowledge, information, and belief. I am of sound mind and I am not taking any medication nor have I ingested any alcohol that would impair my memory of the facts stated in this affidavit.
2. I told my trial defense lawyers that my blood in the RAV had been taken from my sink.
3. Whenever I had to crush a vehicle, I used a front-end loader. I would not keep a key for any vehicle that I intended to crush. Even if I did not use a loader to move a vehicle, I would not need the key to start it because I could hot-wire it.
4. I made a number of appointments for AutoTrader photo shoots with Teresa Halbach before October 31, 2005. On days when we had scheduled appointments, Teresa Halbach would call me if she was running late.



5. No guns were shot in the garage except Rollie Johnson's .22 rifle. I know that Rollie would shoot his rifle into gopher holes near the garage door. Sometimes bullet fragments and shell casings ended up on the floor of the garage. Sometimes, Jodi Stachowski would fire Rollie Johnson's Marlin .22 caliber rifle into the floor of the garage.
6. There were seven burn barrels on the Avery property. Barb had four, Chuck had one, Allan and Delores had one, and I had one.
7. The back panel of Roland Johnson's wooden record case in my bedroom was not loose in early November 2005. Whoever damaged that piece of furniture did it after I left the Avery property on November 5. The back of that piece of furniture was held on by nails and was very sturdy.
8. I noticed my toothbrush was missing in photographs taken by investigators (Trial exhibit 206). My toothbrush must have been taken from my bathroom after law enforcement began their occupation of the Avery property on November 5, 2005.

Events of October 31, 2005

9. When I called AutoTrader on October 31, 2005, at 8:12 a.m., I told the receptionist that the appointment was for Barbara Janda. I told her my sister's full name, not her first initial, because Barb owned the minivan to be listed in AutoTrader. I told the AutoTrader employee that the appointment was at 12932 Avery Road.
10. I called AutoTrader at 11:04 a.m. on October 31, 2005, to find out if the appointment was that day. I again told the AutoTrader employee my sister Barb's full name because Barb owned the vehicle to be listed in AutoTrader. I did the same when I listed a vehicle owned by Thomas Janda in AutoTrader. The AutoTrader employee told me that the

photographer was coming to the property around 2:00 p.m. I told the AutoTrader employee that the photographer should come to 12932 Avery Road.

11. Sometimes, I used the *67 features when I made calls from my cell phone. When I called Ms. Halbach at 2:24 p.m. before she arrived and 2:35 p.m. on October 31, 2005, after she left, I dialed *67 so that if Ms. Halbach did not answer, she would not see my number and feel like she had to return my call. I called at 2:24 p.m. to see when she would get there, but she didn't answer the call.
12. Ms. Halbach got to our property around 2:31 p.m. When I looked out of the window of my trailer, I saw her taking a picture of my sister's van. I put on my shoes to go outside and pay her. I saw her start to walk toward my trailer when I was going outside, but when she saw me she waved and turned around and walked to her car. I went over to her car and I remember she was sitting in the driver's seat with door open and the engine was running. I went over and handed her \$40.00 in cash for the ad. She gave me an AutoTrader magazine and drove away. I remember she turned left on Highway 147 from Avery Road.
13. I noticed that the exterior of her car was very clean. There were no visible dirt or mud stains and it looked clean. Her driver's side parking light was not broken. Ms. Halbach got to our property within a few minutes after I called her at 2:24 p.m.
14. I looked at the AutoTrader magazine that Ms. Halbach gave me and saw that they had front loaders for sale. I called at 2:35 p.m. to see if she could come back to take a picture of a front loader I wanted to sell in AutoTrader magazine. I hung up before Ms. Halbach picked up the phone.

15. When I called Teresa Halbach at 4:35 p.m. on October 31, 2005, I got an automatic message that said that her voice mailbox was full. I told Jodi this information in one of our phone calls that evening. I called at 4:35 p.m. to set up an appointment for the front loader.
16. I had a bonfire on October 31, 2005. The fire started around 7:00 p.m. The fire burned for about two or two and a half hours. I invited my nephew, Brendan, to come over. Brendan went home before Jodi called at 8:57 p.m. The fire burned quickly because we were burning brush. I used gas to start the fire. By the time Jodi Stachowski called at 8:57 p.m., the fire was almost over.
17. I would burn trash from my kitchen, like plastic milk jugs and boxes, in the burn barrel north of my trailer every two weeks. I did not use gas or any other fuel to start the fire. I used a lighter and some brush to start the fire. I did not burn garbage in my burn barrel on the evening of October 31, 2005. I had burned garbage a week before Halloween and did not have enough trash on Halloween to warrant burning garbage. When I burned garbage a week before Halloween, Robert Fabian, my brother Earl's brother-in-law, had come over to shoot rabbits with Earl. They drove up to my trailer in my mother's golf cart and we made small talk. I know that Robert Fabian testified that this event took place on Halloween, but I know that it took place a week before because I did not burn any garbage in the burn barrel north of my house on Halloween.

Events of November 3, 2005

18. On the evening of November 3, 2005, Manitowoc County Sheriff's Department Sergeant Colborn visited the Avery property to ask if I knew anything about the disappearance of

Teresa Halbach.

19. After that conversation, I drove my Pontiac Grand Am from my parents' residence to its usual parking spot outside of my garage. I got out of my car and walked to my sister's trailer, which was right next to mine. There, I broke open a cut on the outside of the middle finger of my right hand as I was attempting to unhitch my sister Barb's trailer. Before going to my trailer to put masking tape on my finger, I went into my Pontiac to grab my phone charger. I dripped blood in my Pontiac on the gearshift and other places. Anyone who looked through the windows of my Pontiac could have seen the blood on the gearshift, and known there was a cut on my hand. I left my Pontiac unlocked.
20. Then, I entered my trailer through the south door because it was closest to the bathroom. I did not lock the south door of my trailer after I entered through it. A large amount of blood dripped onto the rim and sink and the floor of the bathroom. I did not wash away or wipe up because my brother Chuckie was waiting for me to go to Menards in Manitowoc with him. I think I left somewhere between 7:15 and 7:30 p.m. I quickly wrapped my finger in duct tape and left the trailer to meet Chuckie. I left through the front door of my trailer.
21. I tried to tell my trial defense attorneys about the blood in the sink. They did not listen to me and told the jury the blood came from a blood tube at the Courthouse.
22. While Chuckie and I were leaving Avery property, driving a flatbed to Menards in Manitowoc, I saw taillights in front of my trailer. The taillights were further apart and higher off the ground than sedan taillights. I told my brother, who was driving, about the taillights. We turned around and drove to my trailer, but the vehicle was gone.

23. I believe the vehicle was facing my trailer from the northwest. The vehicle would be facing this direction if it drove to my trailer from Kuss Road east across the field between Kuss Road and my trailer. The shape of the taillights was like a RAV-4, not a police squad car. They were wider apart and higher off the ground.
24. After leaving Menards, Chuckie and I stopped by the Manitowoc County Jail, where I left some money for Jodi. By the time we got home, sometime around 10:00 or 10:30 p.m., I was real tired. I went into my trailer through the front door and went straight to bed. I did not go back into my bathroom on November 3.
25. I did not call the AutoTrader office on November 3, 2005. I did not tell anyone that Ms. Halbach missed our October 31 appointment. I told every person who asked whether Ms. Halbach made our October 31 appointment that she arrived between 2:00 p.m. and 2:30 p.m., completed the appointment, and left shortly after.

Events of November 4, 2005

26. On November 4, I woke up at 6:00 a.m. and went into the bathroom to take a shower. I saw that most of the blood on my sink, which I had not cleaned up the previous night, was gone. It seemed to me that the blood had been cleaned up. I did not clean the blood and none of my family members had been in my trailer.
27. Two police officers in an unmarked car were by my trailer when I went to my trailer on a golf cart on the morning of November 4. They asked me if they could search my trailer. I let them search my trailer. After they left, I locked my trailer and went back to work.
28. I smelled cigarette smoke in my trailer on November 4. This was very strange because I did not smoke and Jodi, who lived with me, did not smoke. I thought that because my

trailer smelled like smoke, someone else had been in my trailer and I said that in one of my interviews.

29. My brother Chuck called me on the evening of November 2005 and told me that there were headlights down by his house. I checked my phone records and know that he called my at 7:20 p.m. I went down by his trailer but didn't see any headlights.

Events of November 5, 2005

30. Early in the morning on November 5, 2005, before I left for the family property in Crivitz, WI, I opened the south door of my trailer and observed pry marks near the door latch. I left for the family cabin in Crivitz shortly after that.

Events of November 9, 2005

31. During the physical examination of my body on November 9, 2005, the nurse took two swabs near my groin at the request of Calumet County Investigator Wiegert. I saw the nurse who took the groin swabs hand them to Investigator Wiegert. As I was being taken out of the exam room by Agent Fassbender and the nurse, I saw Investigator Wiegert pretend to put the swabs in the hospital-type waste basket but I did not actually see the swabs leave his hands and fall into the basket.

Pro Se Post-Conviction Proceedings

32. When I was preparing my *pro se* post-conviction motion, I did not have any way to contact labs because I could not get in contact with an attorney. I sent letters to labs whose addresses I could find. When labs did write back, they told me they could not help because I did not have an attorney. Many attorneys informed me that they would not represent me. Some law firms even returned my letters without opening and reading

them. I sent letters to and called attorneys in Wisconsin, Illinois, Minnesota, and Iowa. Some of the attorneys told me that my case was too hard for them to take. I had no money to get an attorney, investigator, or independent lab. I even wrote to Dean Strang's ex-wife for help because she was an investigator. She did not write back.

33. One of my attorneys, Steven Glynn, told me that being my lawyer would hurt his law firm.
34. I dropped out of high school after 11th grade to help out with the family business. I had always been in special education classes.
35. Prison law library only had Lexis Nexis. I had no other way to look at case law or get an investigator.

Correspondence with Ken Kratz

36. Ken Kratz, the prosecutor from my 2007 criminal trial, contacted me in 2013. He wanted to meet with me to talk about writing a book together. Copies of the letters Mr. Kratz wrote me and I wrote Mr. Kratz are attached as Exhibit A to this affidavit.

Current Post-Conviction Proceedings and Testing

37. I really wanted every form of testing suggested by my current post-conviction counsel. For example, I did brainwave testing to see if I was lying. I would not do these tests if I were guilty. I have nothing to hide because I did not kill Ms. Halbach.
38. My current attorney, Kathleen Zellner, brought a Toyota key with her when visiting me. She told me to hold it in my hand for twelve minutes, which I did.

SUPPLEMENTAL AFFIDAVIT OF STEVEN A. AVERY, SR.

Now comes your affiant, Steven A. Avery, Sr., and under oath hereby states as follows:

1. I am the defendant in this case. I am of legal majority and can truthfully and competently testify to the matters contained herein based upon my personal knowledge. The factual statements herein are true and correct to the best of my knowledge, information, and belief. I am of sound mind and I am not taking any medication nor have I ingested any alcohol that would impair my memory of the facts stated in this affidavit.
2. Bobby Dassey, in his November 5, 2005 police interview, lied when he denied having ever seen Teresa Halbach before October 31, 2005. (SAO 1295). I distinctly remember that every time Teresa Halbach came to our property to photograph vehicles, Bobby would always say, "I see that your girlfriend was over yesterday," the following day.
3. After I moved into my trailer, I never entered my sister Barb's residence at 1290 A Avery Road when no one else was home. The only occasions when I was in Barb's residence were when I had been admitted into the residence by Barb or one of my nephews. I did not have a key to Barb's residence, and the residence was locked when no one was home.



4. I was aware that my sister Barb had a computer in her trailer. I was present one time when Barb turned on the computer which was in Bobby's room. Another woman, whom I did not know, was present at the time.
5. I never turned on Barb's computer and used her computer in any way. I did not have the password for the computer. On one occasion, I observed Blaine on the computer communicating with his girlfriend.
6. I had my own computer with internet service. There would be no reason that I would need to be on Barb's computer.
7. My computer was never used to do Google searches. My girlfriend, Jodi, and my sister, Barb, did Yahoo searches. I was present with my sister, Barb, who did a search of dating sites for my brother, Chuck, and for property. The only other searches were done by my girlfriend, Jodi. At no time were searches ever done on my computer for images of Teresa Halbach or images of violent pornography.
8. The only adult films I have ever viewed were on DirecTV. On my computer, the only nude photographs I had were ones uploaded by my girlfriend of her and me.
9. After I was arrested, the authorities put an inmate in my cell who was trying to get me to make incriminating statements. I have reviewed the police report of Orville Jacobs. The statements in that report are false. I never told Mr. Jacobs that my sister, Barb, had porn on her computer or that there would be trouble if the porn were found. I know that my attorneys told me they wanted to inspect the Dassey computer and immediately after that telephone conversation with them, the Dassey computer was seized by the authorities. (Attached and incorporated herein as **Exhibit A** is the 4/14/06 CCSD report.

STATE5682-83).

10. My work schedule at the salvage yard was from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Several times when I was at work, I noticed Scott Tadych enter the property in his green truck and proceed to Barb's trailer, where Bobby was at home.
11. I am aware that Prosecutor Kratz has said that I was sweating a lot on October 31, 2005, because I had raped and murdered Ms. Halbach in my bedroom. Mr. Kratz's story is completely and totally false. I never harmed Ms. Halbach in any way. There was no forensic evidence in my trailer that would have shown that a rape and murder occurred there, so Mr. Kratz had to drop the rape charge. Mr. Kratz changed the story to say that the murder of Teresa Halbach was in my garage. Mr. Kratz said I shot Ms. Halbach in the head after carrying her to the garage. After carrying her to the garage, Mr. Kratz said that I threw Teresa Halbach into the rear of her vehicle, then took her out of the vehicle, shot her in the head on my garage floor, put her on a creeper, and threw her body into my fire pit where I started a huge bonfire. Mr. Kratz's ridiculous story is totally false.
12. In order to support his false story, Mr. Kratz added the detail that I was sweating a lot on October 31, 2005, when I supposedly propped a car hood and put branches on Ms. Halbach's vehicle to conceal it. Mr. Kratz's claim about me concealing the vehicle is totally false, and his claim about me sweating a lot is totally false. I did not drink alcohol or take medication which may have caused me to sweat. I did not sweat when I did manual labor for up to eight hours a day at the salvage yard. On October 31, 2005, the outside temperature was about 48 to 50 degrees, so there was no heat which would cause me to sweat.

13. On October 31, 2005, I remember that I called Ms. Halbach once before she got to the Avery property. I called a second time at 2:35 p.m., but hung up immediately because I saw her at the van, photographing it. I have had an opportunity to review my phone records to refresh my memory. Based upon my recent review of my phone records, I know that Ms. Halbach began photographing Barb's van at 2:35 p.m.
14. It did not take Ms. Halbach longer than a minute to complete the shooting of Barb's van. When I saw her drive up and park, I was looking out my front window. When I went outside to pay Ms. Halbach, I noticed that Bobby's Blazer was parked in a space between my sister's trailer and garage. By the time I got to my sister's van, Ms. Halbach had already finished taking the picture of the van. I handed her \$40 for the listing, and she walked to her vehicle and got in. She asked if I needed a receipt and I told her that I didn't. She handed me an AutoTrader magazine, and I thanked her.
15. I walked back to my trailer with the AutoTrader magazine. When I got inside my trailer, I set the magazine down on the computer stand and walked back outside to go and visit my nephew, Bobby.
16. I walked to the middle of my driveway and saw Ms. Halbach's vehicle turning left on Highway 147, headed west. I looked to my right and noticed that Bobby's Blazer was gone.
17. Bobby did not leave before Ms. Halbach because I observed his Blazer parked by Barb's residence when I was outside with Ms. Halbach. If Bobby left a few seconds behind Ms. Halbach, I would have seen his Blazer when I saw Ms. Halbach's vehicle leaving the property.

18. I believe that Bobby left about thirty seconds after Ms. Halbach because I could not see his vehicle. If he left thirty seconds after Ms. Halbach, he would have been near the intersection of the gravel drive — which leads to my and Barb's trailers — and Avery Road. It was not possible to see Bobby's Blazer at that location because there was a dip and a bend in the gravel drive as it approached Avery Road, and there were buildings that blocked my view. If Bobby had left thirty seconds after Ms. Halbach, his Blazer would have been in a position where I would not have been able to see it.

On 04/14/06, I (Inv. WIEGERT of the CALUMET COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT) and DCI Special Agent TOM FASSBENDER did go to the county jail where we met with ORVILLE JACOBS in an interview room. Prior to speaking with ORVILLE, I did read ORVILLE his Miranda Rights to which ORVILLE indicated he understood and agreed to speak with us. A copy of that Miranda Rights form will be included with this report.

ORVILLE stated to us over the last few weeks, he had been talking with STEVEN AVERY who is in the same cellblock as ORVILLE. According to ORVILLE, they were talking about a bonfire and STEVEN had told ORVILLE that his nieces and nephews were supposed to come to his house on the weekend for the fire. STEVEN also mentioned to ORVILLE about burning four tires and ORVILLE stated to me he thought that was weird to burn that amount of tires if you were going to have kids around the fire. STEVEN also told ORVILLE that BRENDON was the only one at the fire with him. STEVEN also stated to ORVILLE that if he would have burned her (TERESA), there would be other bones there. STEVEN also stated to ORVILLE that he (STEVEN) knows that you would have to crush the rest of the bones that would not burn.

ORVILLE went on to say that when they talked again, STEVEN told him that STEVEN's girlfriend had told STEVEN that the police had found blood on the headboard that was located in his bedroom. STEVEN also told ORVILLE the police would not find anything on the mattress. ORVILLE stated to STEVEN at that time the only way there would not be any blood there was if you had cleaned it with bleach or if you had plastic over the mattress. ORVILLE stated after he had said this to STEVEN. STEVEN stopped talking to him.

ORVILLE then told us that prior to them having the conversation about the mattress, STEVEN AVERY stated to ORVILLE that he (STEVEN) knew that really good bleach could get rid of blood.

ORVILLE went on to tell us that also during the conversations, they talked about his niece. ORVILLE believed his niece's name to be CANDY. STEVEN stated to ORVILLE that was the one he supposedly had sexually assaulted; however, STEVEN told ORVILLE that he (STEVEN) had letters from the niece saying how much she liked him and that it was her stepdad, EARL,

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who was assaulting her. STEVEN told ORVILLE he had spent a lot of time with his niece and talked to her because no one else wanted to be around her.

STEVEN also told ORVILLE his sister, BARBARA, has porn on her computer and if it was ever found, there would also be trouble.

STEVEN also mentioned to ORVILLE there was supposed to be an aerial view of TERESA HALBACH's vehicle in the yard with its doors open when the yard was closed off.

I asked ORVILLE if anybody from law enforcement had asked him to get information from STEVEN AVERY to which ORVILLE stated nobody had asked him to do that, he was coming forward on his own freewill.

Special Agent FASSBENDER and I informed ORVILLE that he was not to ask STEVEN AVERY any questions about anything regarding this case.

I asked ORVILLE if he would be willing to write a written statement to which ORVILLE agreed to do. Included in this report will be ORVILLE's written statement.

4. All opinions rendered in this affidavit are based on new bloodstain pattern recommended terminology. Specifically, the use of velocity as a determinative characteristic of bloodstains was abandoned with the production of the Working Group on Bloodstain Pattern Analysis ("SWGSTAIN") terminology. Bloodstain analyst Nick Stahlke ("Stahlke") used velocity to define and interpret the bloodstain pattern observed on the rear cargo door of Ms. Halbach's RAV-4. (R.705:49).

Opinions Regarding Blood in the RAV-4

5. The purpose of this Supplemental Affidavit is to correct the wording in paragraphs 27 and 28 of my original affidavit. Paragraph 27 should state:

27. Through a series of experiments that I observed, I have concluded to a reasonable degree of scientific certainty that the distribution of Mr. Avery's blood in various locations in the passenger compartment of the RAV-4 are consistent with purposeful behavior. The prosecution told the jury that all of the blood deposited in the RAV-4 was from the cut on the middle finger of Mr. Avery's right hand and that he was actively bleeding. (R.696:85). However, there was no blood on the door handle, key, gearshift, interior hood release, hood latch, hood prop, and battery cable.

6. Paragraph 28 should state:

28. It is my opinion that Mr. Avery's blood in the RAV-4 is consistent with being purposefully distributed from a source because his blood is present in some locations but absent in some reasonably anticipated locations, such as those listed in ¶ 27. The absence of blood stains in these locations is inconsistent with an active bleeder.

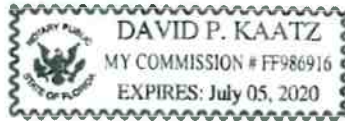

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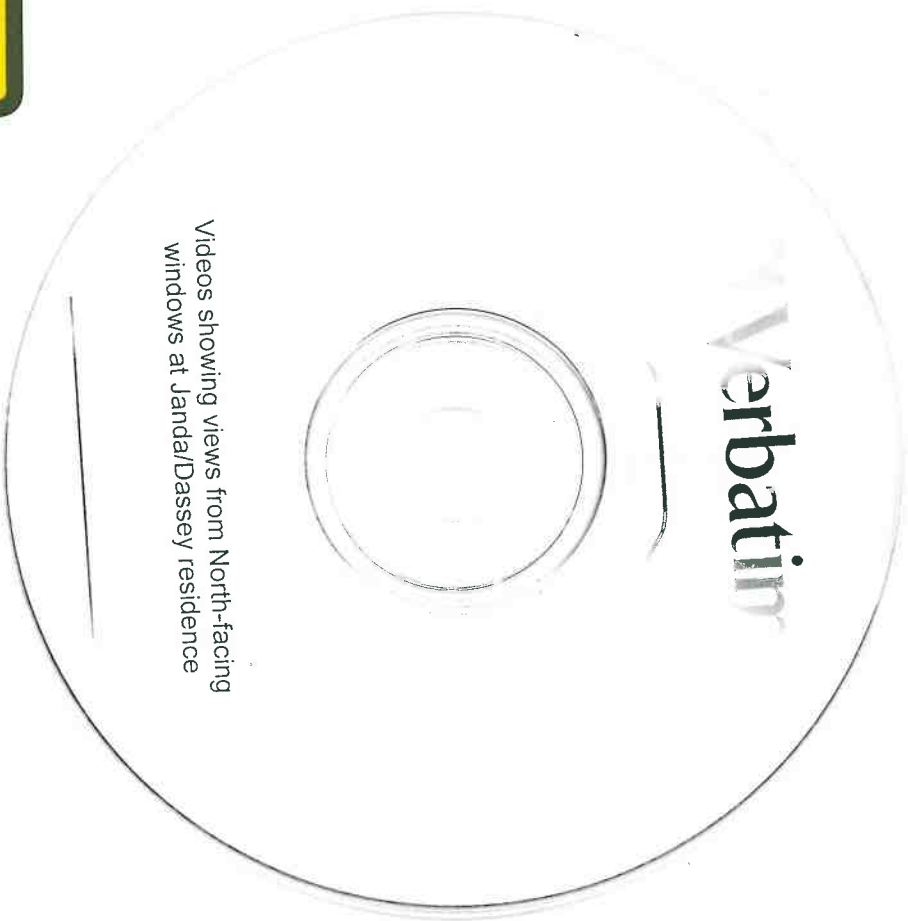

On Friday, 11/17/17 at 0920 hours, Special Agent JEFF WISCH of the WISCONSIN DEPARTMENT OF CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS and I (Special Inv. JOHN DEDERING of the CALUMET COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT) interviewed BOBBY A. DASSEY at his residence of 18010 Horse Road in Mishicot, concerning this follow-up investigation.

BOBBY was advised that he did not have to talk to us and he could cease the interview at any time. We asked BOBBY if he would be honest and truthful with us. BOBBY was asked where he was hunting in October, 2005. BOBBY stated he was hunting on a property owned by NOLA MUELLER (ph). BOBBY stated NOLA also owned the property on which the trailer, occupied by SCOTT TADYCH, was located.

BOBBY stated he was hunting in a deer stand at that time. BOBBY stated in October, 2005 he was employed by FISHER HAMILTON in Manitowoc, working third shift from 2200 hours to 0600 hours. BOBBY indicated he is now employed at a subsidiary of FEDERAL-MOGUL in Manitowoc.

BOBBY was asked if he could describe if he met anyone on his way to hunting on 10/31/05, while driving on STH 147. BOBBY stated he saw SCOTT TADYCH on STH 147 in the area of Jambo Creek Road. BOBBY stated there is a large gravel pit in that area. BOBBY stated he met SCOTT at approximately 3:00 p.m. BOBBY stated he had permission from NOLA MUELLER to hunt on the property behind SCOTT's trailer during October, 2005.

BOBBY was asked if he knew or ever met TERESA HALBACH and he stated "Never." BOBBY was asked if he knew TERESA was coming to take photographs on 10/31/05 and he stated "Nope."

BOBBY was asked if he had seen TERESA on the AVERY property on 10/31/05. BOBBY stated he had seen her. BOBBY stated after he had awoken to go deer hunting, he looked out the front window of his mother's, BARBARA JANDA's, residence and saw TERESA's vehicle parked opposite to a van that his mother was going to sell. BOBBY described his mother's van as being a maroon Dodge Caravan. BOBBY stated the lady got out, started taking pictures and, at this point, he got ready to take a shower before hunting. BOBBY stated the lady was alone. BOBBY stated he spent a couple of minutes in the shower and then got dressed and looked out of his window, again, and saw the lady walking toward STEVEN's trailer. BOBBY stated he did not see STEVEN during this encounter. BOBBY stated he spent maybe a couple of seconds looking out of the window and during this time she was halfway to STEVEN's trailer. BOBBY stated he did not see anyone else in the area other than the lady. BOBBY stated he then went out



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to his vehicle and he did not see her when he got into his vehicle. BOBBY stated he had no idea who she was so he really did not pay a lot of attention. BOBBY stated the vehicle was still there when he left to go hunting. BOBBY stated he did not hear anything during the time when he was walking to his vehicle. BOBBY indicated he did not see TERESA leave the property. BOBBY was asked if he ever saw TERESA after he saw her walking toward STEVEN's trailer and he stated he had never seen her after that. BOBBY stated he never saw TERESA leave the property.

BOBBY then drew a map of the area where he witnessed these events and a copy can be found attached to this report.

BOBBY stated he did not recall seeing anyone when he got home from hunting, but when he left to go to work at 2120 to 2125 hours, he saw a fire behind STEVEN's garage and two people were standing by the fire. BOBBY indicated he was unsure who these two people were. BOBBY was asked if he saw TERESA's vehicle when he got back from hunting. BOBBY stated her vehicle was gone from the area where he saw it parked earlier when he returned from hunting at approximately 5:30 p.m.

BOBBY was asked if he remembered at any time talking to BRYAN DASSEY about TERESA leaving. BOBBY stated he never talked with BRYAN about seeing TERESA leave. BOBBY stated he never talked with BRYAN at any time about this. BOBBY was asked why BRYAN would say something like this and BOBBY responded, "Your guess is as good as mine." BOBBY stated he has no idea why BRYAN had stated that he had said this. BOBBY stated he never talked to BRYAN about these matters at all.

BOBBY stated he spoke with his mother about the fact that he had seen someone taking pictures of the van. BOBBY stated this was within a day or two of 10/31/05. BOBBY stated he recalled asking his mother why she was selling the van, as it was pretty much junk.

BOBBY was asked if he used the computer and the internet, while he was living at his mother's residence. BOBBY stated he did not recall, but stated, "If I did, it wasn't often." Initially, BOBBY indicated he did not recall if they had the internet at his mother's residence. BOBBY stated the tower computer was the only computer in the residence "I think." BOBBY stated everyone was on the computer, but he stated BLAINE and BRENDAN were the main users, as they used it for games. BOBBY stated he thought the computer was on a desk in the living room at the time.

BOBBY was asked if he ever downloaded or viewed pornography on his mother's computer. BOBBY stated he never downloaded any pornography. BOBBY stated he may have watched porn at some point on it, but indicated "I don't know." BOBBY stated there were five guys with access to the computer and he doesn't know if they would have downloaded or viewed pornography. I asked BOBBY who the fifth person was. BOBBY identified his brothers, BLAINE, BRENDAN, BRYAN, himself and TOM JANDA, as being the individuals with access

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to the computer. BOBBY stated he did not use the computer much, as he was working third shift at the time.

BOBBY was asked where his mother's computer was located in his mother's residence in October, 2005. BOBBY stated he thought it was in the living room. BOBBY was asked if it was ever in his bedroom and he stated it was not. BOBBY stated he had a 10'x12' bedroom and there was not much room in the bedroom after putting in dressers and beds. BOBBY stated he thought he shared the bedroom with his brother, BRYAN. BOBBY stated BRYAN eventually moved to the downstairs portion of the residence and this may have taken place before 10/31/05.

I asked BOBBY how he got along with TOM JANDA and he stated he got along with TOM, but he did not get along with SCOTT TADYCH at this time. BOBBY stated SCOTT did not like kids. BOBBY indicated that he believed TOM JANDA moved out of BARBARA's residence sometime in September. BOBBY stated SCOTT TADYCH did not come over to his mother's residence very often, but that BARBARA would go to SCOTT's residence.

BOBBY was asked if STEVEN had internet at his residence and he indicated he was not certain. BOBBY stated he was not at STEVEN's residence that often.

BOBBY was asked if he knew who created the folder with the page depicting STEVEN and TERESA's photographs. BOBBY indicated he knew how to create folders, but he had no idea as to who created those folders. BOBBY was specifically asked who created "TERESA" and "HALBACH" and "DNA" folders that were on the computer and he stated he had no idea who did this. BOBBY was asked if he did it and he indicated, "No."

BOBBY was asked if he ever hunted on the RADANDT property or gravel pit or in the area off Kuss Road in Two Rivers. BOBBY was unfamiliar with where I was talking about when I mentioned Kuss Road. I then produced a map that I had from the JOSH RADANDT interview and showed him where Kuss Road was located. BOBBY indicated he had never hunted on the RADANDT property or in the gravel pit. BOBBY stated he had never hunted on the area off of Kuss Road.

I asked BOBBY if he ever met RYAN HILLEGAS and SCOTT BLOEDORN. BOBBY stated he had never met RYAN or SCOTT and did not know either of them.

BOBBY was asked why he and SCOTT TADYCH were being singled out as suspects and he indicated "I don't know." BOBBY then indicated he thought it was perhaps because he and SCOTT testified at STEVEN's trial.

I asked BOBBY if he had made anything up or had lied during his testimony. BOBBY stated everything he had said was true and he had no reason to lie during the trial.

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BOBBY was asked if he had any opinion on STEVEN's involvement or whether STEVEN had done this. BOBBY stated in some ways he thinks STEVEN could have done it, but sometimes not. BOBBY was asked directly if he had any involvement in the death of TERESA HALBACH and he indicated "No."

BOBBY discussed STEVEN AVERY talking to him and MICHAEL OSMONSEN about the disposing of a body. BOBBY stated he had gotten a roadkill deer and the same day he and MICHAEL OSMONSEN were in the DASSEY garage skinning the deer out. BOBBY stated STEVEN came over and asked if they wanted to dispose of a body. BOBBY stated STEVEN was alone when he came over and asked this question. BOBBY stated he thought STEVEN was joking around. BOBBY stated this exchange took place in the afternoon hours. BOBBY stated he told STEVEN "No" and at that time STEVEN turned around and walked out. BOBBY stated STEVEN laughed after making the statement.

BOBBY stated he learned that same evening that TERESA HALBACH was missing. It should be noted, DCI reports showed that BOBBY DASSEY claimed a car kill deer on 11/04/05.

BOBBY was asked if JODI STACHOWSKI spent any time at his mother's residence and he indicated he was not sure. BOBBY stated JODI may have stopped in from time to time. BOBBY went on to indicate that he was talking about the day TERESA was reported missing, not the day she actually went missing. BOBBY stated, once again, this conversation with STEVEN took place prior to seeing any news media coverage of TERESA HALBACH being missing.

BOBBY indicated there was nothing out of the ordinary about any family members after 10/31/05. BOBBY indicated that he would tell if he knew of any family member that was involved in TERESA HALBACH's murder. BOBBY stated he did not watch MAKING A MURDERER, but he did watch a little bit of DR. PHIL concerning the AVERY case.

BOBBY indicated, "How many people can you blame it on, before you run out of people." BOBBY was apparently referring to Attorney ZELLNER'S claims. BOBBY stated he does visit his brother, BRENDAN, in prison, but not as much as he would like to. BOBBY stated that he does not believe BRENDAN is involved in the homicide and indicated "from day one" BRENDAN said that he never did anything. BOBBY indicated BRENDAN stated the investigators "got in his head." BOBBY stated this is all BRENDAN ever said about the incident.

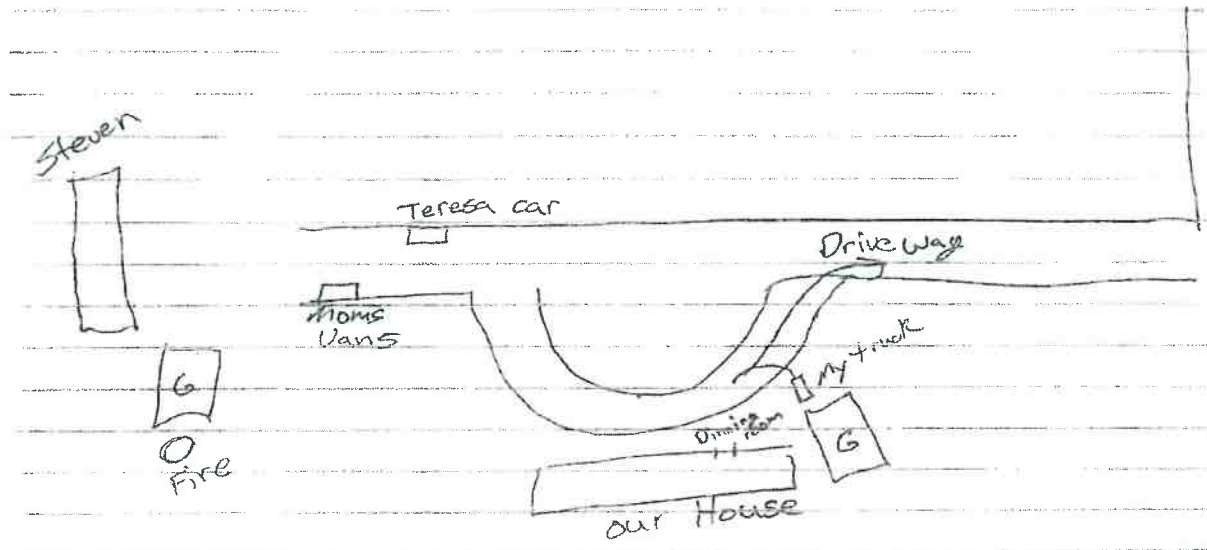
Our interview with BOBBY ended at 1010 hours. Investigation continues.

On Friday, 11/03/17 at 0959 hours, I (Special Inv. JOHN DEDERING of the CALUMET COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT), along with Sgt. Inv. ERIC VOLAND of the CALUMET COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, interviewed BRYAN J. DASSEY, DOB 07/15/85, at his residence of 1516 Crystal Spring Road, Two Rivers, Wisconsin, 54241. BRYAN's current phone number is 920-973-2125.

BRYAN was initially reluctant to be interviewed concerning this matter and indicated he was not much of a witness and really had nothing to offer. BRYAN ultimately agreed to let us speak with him for approximately ten minutes.

BRYAN started out the interview by stating that he had never trusted law enforcement and was in fear of law enforcement even while we were seated at his dining room table. BRYAN stated, while he has no criminal record, this was just something he could not get past. BRYAN stated he had a lot of exposure to dishonest law enforcement in the past.

I questioned BRYAN regarding his affidavit, which is incorporated with this report. I asked BRYAN to review the affidavit to ensure that it was accurate. BRYAN stated that he, in fact, had reviewed the affidavit before signing it. BRYAN stated the signing was done with a notary at WELLS FARGO BANK in Two Rivers. I asked BRYAN if the individuals he talked with concerning the affidavit seemed pushy and overbearing to him and he indicated they were not. I asked BRYAN if the individuals had attempted to put words in his mouth and he indicated they had not.

I asked BRYAN about the statement of "on or about 11/04/05" and he indicated that he meant he recalled BOBBY telling him concerning seeing TERESA HALBACH driving away from the AVERY property sometime during the week of 10/31/05 through 11/06/05.

I asked BRYAN to describe his normal day and specifically if he had any recollections of 10/31/05. BRYAN indicated he normally left for work at approximately 0600 hours and then would come back to his mother's trailer to shower, change clothes and then leave for his girlfriend's residence. BRYAN stated he was not home on 10/31/05, other than waking up, leaving for work and returning to clean up after work. BRYAN stated he had no other memory of 10/31/05.

BRYAN indicated he has basically been on his own since he was approximately 17 and one-half years old. BRYAN indicated the reason he did not spend any time around his mother's, BARBARA JANDA, residence was that he could not stand SCOTT TADYCH and was not

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happy with his mother's conduct of still being married while being involved with SCOTT. BRYAN stated he spent enough time at his mother's residence to clean up and then leave on the majority of the days.

I asked BRYAN if he could remember what day the deer carcass was placed in the DASSEY garage and he indicated he could not remember.

I asked BRYAN about the statement concerning BOBBY DASSEY indicating he had seen TERESA leave the AVERY property. BRYAN stated he could not remember where the conversation took place and further indicated that he could not recall if it was in person or over the phone. BRYAN indicated it was sometime within the week of 11/04/05. I asked BRYAN if the conversation took place before or after TERESA's car was found and he indicated that he was unsure about that. I asked BRYAN if BOBBY could have possibly said that he left and not TERESA. BRYAN indicated he was sure BOBBY said he saw TERESA leave.

I, again, asked BRYAN if he had any recollection of when and where this conversation took place and he indicated he was not at all sure. BRYAN stated he remember "bits and pieces." At one point during the conversation, BRYAN made the statement that if "he did it he should stay in prison and if not, someone is still out there who needs to answer for this."

I asked BRYAN how long he would stay at his mother's residence if he was not sleeping there. BRYAN indicated he would basically just clean up and go. BRYAN stated sometimes he would have a meal but indicated that did not happen very often. I asked BRYAN if he could recall whether he had seen BOBBY at the residence on Halloween, 10/31/05. BRYAN stated he could not recall if he was even there on Halloween. BRYAN stated it was common to see BOBBY because he believed that, at that time, BOBBY was working second shift.

I asked BRYAN where the computers were located in his mother's house. BRYAN stated he had no idea. I asked BRYAN how many computers were at his mother's residence and BRYAN had no idea about that either. BRYAN stated, however, he recalled one laptop computer being at the residence.

I asked BRYAN if he had been at STEVEN AVERY's bonfire anytime on 10/31/05 and he indicated "no." I asked BRYAN if he recalled seeing smoke coming from behind STEVEN's garage on 10/31/05 and he indicated he "did not recall." I asked BRYAN if he recalled saying that STEVEN seemed odd during the time they were in Crivitz on 11/04/05 through 11/06/05. BRYAN indicated it was not unusual for STEVEN to act odd, which he attributed to being incarcerated for something he had not done.

I asked BRYAN about him stating that STEVEN "freaked out" when he heard authorities were coming to the cabin in Marinette. BRYAN stated he had no memory of this statement.

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I asked BRYAN if there was anything he wanted to add to this interview and he indicated he could think of anything. The interview terminated at approximately 1030 hours.

Investigation continues.

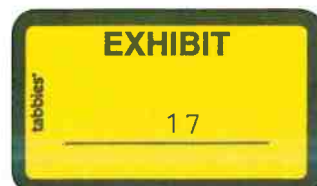

AVERY: Norb's. Mostly it's only Earl and me, once in a while, we're down there.

O'NEILL: To crush cars?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Ok.

AVERY: The ones down there right now, we did. We did all of 'em.

O'NEILL: When's the last time you guys crushed cars?

AVERY: Probably last week.

O'NEILL: What days?

AVERY: I don't, I don't remember.

O'NEILL: How many cars did you guys do?

AVERY: Uh, I think there's three or four loads down there.

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O'NEILL: What's a—how many is a load?

AVERY: I think about 12.

O'NEILL: So, think you did three or four loads last week?

AVERY: Well, no. Just some last week 'cause we're cleaning up on, on the top—
and we gotta take the motors out and everything else.

O'NEILL: How many cars do you think you would've crushed last week?

AVERY: Maybe 12, 13.

O'NEILL: Ok. Did they, did they go anywhere?

AVERY: No.

O'NEILL: They all stayed on the site.

AVERY: Yeah, they're all there.

O'NEILL: Chuck or Earl helped you?

AVERY: No, just Earl.

O'NEILL: Just Earl.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Was he doing them by himself, or with your help?

AVERY: Umm, I helped him a little bit. But he, uh, cleaned 'em up on top.

O'NEILL: When you're saying "cleaned them," means taking out—

AVERY: Yeah, motors and trannies and gas tanks and tires.

O'NEILL: Ok. And besides you guys doing them then Norb's does them as well?

AVERY: Yeah.

SKORLINSKI: Ok.

AVERY: Yeah, Norb's does the most of the work.

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SKORLINSKI: But you know how to operate it?

AVERY: Yeah.

SKORLINSKI: You and Earl operate it.

AVERY: Yeah.

SKORLINSKI: Ok. So, Friday you guys sight in the rifle, and then, umm, Friday night when does Chuck come up here? Does he come up here on Friday night?

AVERY: Well, Thursday night we got to go get, uh, lumber.

SKORLINSKI: Ok. All right.

AVERY: Because we were leaving out the driveway and I seen lights by my place.

SKORLINSKI: Ok. And when you say you seen lights by your place—

AVERY: I seen tail lights.

SKORLINSKI: Going away from your place.

AVERY: No, going by it.

SKORLINSKI: Ok. On what road?

AVERY: This is on the long way, I've seen it. Because we were going by the, almost by the stop sign—

SKORLINSKI: Ok.

AVERY: And I looked, and I spotted the lights.

O'NEILL: [To Skorlinski] Can you get the [unintelligible] please?

SKORLINSKI: [To O'Neill] Where's that?

O'NEILL: [To Skorlinski] The big black thing underneath the—the very bottom.

SKORLINSKI: [To O'Neill] Is that where the diagram is?

O'NEILL: [To Skorlinski] I want to do a new one.

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O'NEILL: You kind of chopped off that diagram yesterday because you put the houses but you didn't put the yard and stuff, you know? Do me a favor, take your time. Let's start with a new diagram. We'll put the road way up here, OK?

AVERY: Ok.

O'NEILL: So, Avery Road is right here. Let's call it Avery Road, this way. And then what, 172 it is? Then, you know, include the yard and all the property if you can. Take your time. I don't know how you were in art class. I was terrible.

AVERY: Heh-heh, shit! [Laughter.]

O'NEILL: [Laughter.] I did stick people.

AVERY: Hmm. You got this as Avery Road?

O'NEILL: Yeah. Just—

AVERY: Ok.

O'NEILL: Make that kind of like the driveway or something for the business area.

AVERY: Ok, Ok.

O'NEILL: Do whatever you want, there. We've, we've never been there so it kind of helps us understand what you're talking about sometimes. So use up some space, if we need more paper we'll just, uh, add some on there too. [Avery draws diagram.] Ok.

AVERY: This is all the yard.

O'NEILL: Ok. So now this is the fenced in area?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: This is what?

AVERY: That's the impound.

O'NEILL: The impound?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: This is?

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AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: So that's the impound, right?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: This the fence?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: This right here?

AVERY: That's the garage.

O'NEILL: Is this the garage that you refer to when you go to work? Is this the garage you go to?

AVERY: No. This one.

SKORLINSKI: Is that the shop?

AVERY: That's the shop.

SKORLINSKI: That's what you guys call the shop.

AVERY: Yeah.

SKORLINSKI: Ok.

O'NEILL: Ok. We'll call this the shop. What's this referred to?

AVERY: The storage.

O'NEILL: What do you keep in there.

AVERY: Umm, alternators, uh, starters, uh—

O'NEILL: Things that you pull out of cars?

AVERY: Yeah. Radiators—

O'NEILL: Ok. This is Chuck's what?

AVERY: House.

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O'NEILL: And, right here?

AVERY: That's Ma's house.

O'NEILL: And here?

AVERY: That's another garage.

O'NEILL: What's that garage for?

AVERY: That used to be the main garage.

O'NEILL: Oh, so it's the old shop?

AVERY: Yeah, the old shop.

O'NEILL: Ok. Right here? That's the, uh, impound?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Barb's house?

AVERY: Barb's house.

O'NEILL: That's you?

AVERY: That's me.

O'NEILL: Steve's house.

AVERY: Yep.

O'NEILL: What's this?

AVERY: That's a garage.

O'NEILL: Is it like a car garage, or what?

AVERY: Yeah, yeah.

O'NEILL: And then you have a pool too, right?

AVERY: Yeah.

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O'NEILL: Where's that at?

AVERY: It's back here—

O'NEILL: Pool, right. Now, as far as the pit, where's the pit at in all of this whole thing?

AVERY: Uh, let's see. It probably goes, uh, uh, like this. Then this way. This is all pit.

O'NEILL: This whole area right here is all pit?

AVERY: Yeah, yeah.

O'NEILL: And when you call it a pit, is it, is it the yard pit?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Where all the cars go?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Ok. So this is the junkyard pit.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Ok. Down in this pit area where all the cars are, what kind of equipment's down in here? Anything?

AVERY: Uh, there's—the crusher's back here.

O'NEILL: Right here?

AVERY: Yeah. Then there's a pond.

O'NEILL: Where's the pond?

AVERY: Uh, about right in here.

O'NEILL: Want to draw the pond, just a little bit.

AVERY: Kinda like, like that.

O'NEILL: Ok. Ok, so there's the pond. What else is down there of importance? Any front end loaders or any things like that?

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AVERY: No.

O'NEILL: Ok. How about—what do you guys use to go from the garage to the pit and stuff? Do you drive your cars or golf carts like you have here?

AVERY: Oh, sometimes old beaters.

O'NEILL: Old beaters?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: You have, like, like this? Like, that?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Uh, golf carts and things too, or?

AVERY: Yeah, my Ma's got one. We use that once in a while. She does.

O'NEILL: What do you use that for?

AVERY: Will haul parts down there.

O'NEILL: So that's for hauling' parts back and forth?

AVERY: Well, it ain't. But Ma, you know, she drives it.

O'NEILL: Ok. So where's she usually keep that at?

AVERY: That's in her garage.

O'NEILL: Where's her garage?

AVERY: Oh I got—it's close to right here.

O'NEILL: She has a garage right here?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Where do you guys usually store the golf cart? Right there, right?

AVERY: Yeah. In her garage.

O'NEILL: Ok. Let's go back to the van. Where'd you say the van was at?

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AVERY: What van? Oh, right here on the road.

O'NEILL: Right on the road?

AVERY: Well, here's the rest of the property line—

O'NEILL: Mm-hmm.

AVERY: So it was right here.

O'NEILL: Ok. So this is where the van was. And where does she park, Teresa?

AVERY: Uh, when she came, I don't know she parked uh, about right there.

O'NEILL: Ok. And that was a green SUV, right?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Which way was she facing?

AVERY: That way.

O'NEILL: This way?

AVERY: Yeah.

SKORLINSKI: And you saw her from—where'd you see her from?

AVERY: The house.

SKORLINSKI: Your, your house.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: And you were there since 11 you said, right?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Who else was home at Barb's house when she came, do you know?

AVERY: Bobby was.

O'NEILL: Bobby?

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AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Ok. Anybody else that was home, that you know of? Bryan? was that your other—

AVERY: No, Bryan was working.

O'NEILL: So Bobby was home.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Where's Barb at?

AVERY: Barb was working too.

O'NEILL: So, Bobby was at the house.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: How do you, how do you know he was there?

AVERY: After, after I went over there, then—

O'NEILL: So, later after you got done with her—

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Then you went over to Barb's, you said?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Who was at Barb's when you were over?

AVERY: Well, he was.

O'NEILL: And nobody else?

AVERY: No, nobody else was—

O'NEILL: And why did, why did you stop at Barb's?

AVERY: I don't know. I mostly just walk right over there.

O'NEILL: Pardon?

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AVERY: I just mostly walk right over there.

O'NEILL: So after she leaves, you put the Auto Trader magazine in your house.

AVERY: Yeah, and I went over there.

O'NEILL: And you walked right over, right away?

AVERY: Yeah. Well, he was gone. He'd just left.

O'NEILL: Bobby did?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Ok. So you walk over to Barb's though, right?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Who's there?

AVERY: After she left, when I walked over there, he—he left.

SKORLINSKI: Did you see him leave?

AVERY: No.

SKORLINSKI: So he was already gone.

AVERY: Yeah. He just left.

O'NEILL: So nobody was at Barb's then?

AVERY: No. But the first time, when I come home or before that, I went over there and I talked to Bobby.

O'NEILL: 11 O'clock?

AVERY: Yeah, somewhere in there.

O'NEILL: Ok.

AVERY: Uh, or it was after—it was 12 O'clock, because I was outside for a while.

O'NEILL: Ok.

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AVERY: Because I went in the house.

SKORLINSKI: Barb's already gone?

AVERY: Yeah.

SKORLINSKI: Ok.

AVERY: I know I talked to him somewhere in there, I, I can't remember.

O'NEILL: But before she came, you talked to Bobby?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: And then after she left, you went over by Barb's. Bobby left.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: What'd Bobby leave—what, what did he drive somewhere or take—

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: What'd he drive?

AVERY: Yeah, he took his Blazer.

O'NEILL: Do you know where he went?

AVERY: No.

O'NEILL: Ok. So when you're there at 11 O'clock, sometime after 11 O'clock, you actually talk to Bobby?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: And then, you go back to your place?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: And then, when the lady comes at two O'clock you talk to her. Then you get done with her and you go back over to Barb's but Bobby's gone because the Blazer's gone?

AVERY: Yeah.

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O'NEILL: Did you go inside there at all?

AVERY: No, no.

O'NEILL: Ok. Where'd you go from there?

AVERY: Went back home.

O'NEILL: Ok. And you stayed there up until supper time?

AVERY: Probably somewhere in there.

O'NEILL: Ok. Just wanna make sure it's—

AVERY: With my ma.

O'NEILL: All right.

SKORLINSKI: Why, why did you—

AVERY: I think, uh, I talked to Jodi before I went by Ma's house to eat.

O'NEILL: Jodi?

AVERY: My fiancé.

O'NEILL: On the phone?

AVERY: Yeah.

SKORLINSKI: Before supper, rather than after?

AVERY: Yeah.

SKORLINSKI: Do you think you talked to her after too, or not?

AVERY: Yeah, I talked to her after that, too.

SKORLINSKI: You think before.

AVERY: Well, I talked to her twice that day.

O'NEILL: She calls you?

AVERY: Yeah.

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O'NEILL: Predetermined times?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: What times do you have it set that you talk to her?

AVERY: Five, six O'clock?

O'NEILL: So you—

AVERY: First time.

O'NEILL: She's in jail she has to call collect, right?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: So, do you guys have it arranged that she's calling you at a specific time?

AVERY: Yeah, mostly at five O'clock, you know.

O'NEILL: Every day?

AVERY: Well, most.

O'NEILL: Or is she trying all day?

AVERY: No, she ain't trying all day. 'Cause she knows I'm working all day.

O'NEILL: Ok. So between five and six, which normally you're out of work.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: You're waiting at your place for a phone call from her, more than likely.

AVERY: Yeah.

SKORLINSKI: Ok.

AVERY: Most of the time, you know, at five O'clock when I get done I go eat, so. Then, at six O'clock when she calls.

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O'NEILL: We talked about the crusher, the pond, the whole junkyard pit. Is there anything else down there like front end loaders, or, uh, any other equipment? How about—do you guys burn stuff, or crush stuff? Or, what do you do with all of your garbage and stuff like that?

AVERY: Mostly back in the corner.

O'NEILL: Where at?

AVERY: Back here.

SKORLINSKI: What's back there?

AVERY: Just garbage where people put their garbage in once—just garbage.

SKORLINSKI: So you guys burn the stuff back there?

AVERY: No, we don't burn nothing back there.

O'NEILL: You just, you toss garbage back there.

AVERY: Yeah, yeah.

O'NEILL: Do you guys burn anything?

AVERY: No.

O'NEILL: Ok. You don't have any burning barrels, or open pits, or?

AVERY: Not in the pit, no.

O'NEILL: Ok. Down in your residential area, where you guys live?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Do you guys burn your garbage?

AVERY: We got ours. Burning barrels, and that.

O'NEILL: Where, where at?

AVERY: Umm, mom's got one there.

O'NEILL: Mom's got one here?

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AVERY: Yeah. And my sister's got some over here.

O'NEILL: Over here?

AVERY: And I think I got one out here.

O'NEILL: You got one out front?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Where at? Right here?

AVERY: Yeah, some place in there, yeah.

O'NEILL: Ok, then where's your sister got some?

AVERY: Umm, behind the house.

O'NEILL: Right here?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: How many?

AVERY: Probably three, four of 'em.

O'NEILL: Three or four?

AVERY: Yeah, somewhere in there.

O'NEILL: She has kids.

AVERY: Yeah! [Laughter.] And a lot of garbage.

O'NEILL: Yeah. So your mom has one. Your sister has about three or four. You have one.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: What about Chuck?

AVERY: Yeah, he's got one too.

O'NEILL: Where at?

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AVERY: I think that's over here some place.

O'NEILL: Ok. So this 'X' equals burning barrels, right? How often do you guys burn? When's the last time you burned?

AVERY: Two weeks ago?

O'NEILL: Ok. What did you burn, just regular garbage?

AVERY: Just garbage.

O'NEILL: Ok. How about at mom's? Do you do any of their stuff, like take out their garbage, do things like that? Help them out? Burn their garbage?

AVERY: No, no.

O'NEILL: Nothing like that?

AVERY: No.

O'NEILL: Ok. So and back in the pit area, you guys have a common area where you just dump garbage.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: You guys don't do any burning back there?

AVERY: No, no.

O'NEILL: Ok. And I asked you before about any vehicles, any front end loaders, any forklifts, things like that. Are those things part of your operation back there?

AVERY: No. That's all we—we keep our shit in the buildings.

O'NEILL: What do you have for equipment there?

AVERY: A loader, a skid-steer. That goes in the shop. The skid-steer does.

O'NEILL: Who, who operates those?

AVERY: We all do.

O'NEILL: Ok. Did you guys operate 'em all last week or no?

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AVERY: Oh yeah.

O'NEILL: What do you usually drive sometimes?

AVERY: Uh, the loader. The forklift.

O'NEILL: Did you do any work with the loader or forklift last week? That you remember? Now you guys did some crushing, right?

AVERY: Well I don't know if that was last week. That could of been the week before.

O'NEILL: That what?

AVERY: The week before last week.

O'NEILL: That what?

AVERY: That we crushed.

O'NEILL: So it may not have been this week at all that you crushed anything?

AVERY: No. No, it was the following week.

SKORLINSKI: Two weeks ago, that you crushed, or?

AVERY: Well yeah, this whole week I was—[audio cuts out]—must be the week before that we crushed them.

SKORLINSKI: The week before.

AVERY: That we crushed them. Because Earl, Earl worked almost all week to get them other ones ready on top.

SKORLINSKI: Ok. When you say in the garage—

O'NEILL: I'll be back. [Exits vehicle.]

SKORLINSKI: What, what's your work you're doing? What are you doing, Steve?

AVERY: Umm, cleaning up the mess. Sweeping. Uh, taking parts off of cars.

SKORLINSKI: Ok. Just putsy stuff.

AVERY: Yeah. I would take the transmission out, motor out and everything.

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SKORLINSKI: On Monday, after Teresa left, you didn't go back to work. Why not?

AVERY: Well, I made some, couple phone calls.

SKORLINSKI: Ok. But you didn't go back to the shop?

AVERY: No, no.

SKORLINSKI: You stayed in your house. Did they know that? Did, uh, Chuck and Earl know that you're not coming back after lunch or whatever?

AVERY: No. No, they didn't know that.

SKORLINSKI: Is it, is it run real—I mean do they, do they care?

AVERY: Oh yeah, they care.

SKORLINSKI: Oh, Ok. What I mean, did you—can you just come and go like that as you, as you please?

AVERY: No, I'm mostly—

SKORLINSKI: Is that uncommon, or?

AVERY: No, this is the first time that I stayed home.

SKORLINSKI: Ok. [O'NEILL enters vehicle.] And you just, you just didn't feel like going back or what?

AVERY: Nah, there's a couple phone calls I made and, no, I had to talk to her, her uh P.O. [Probation Officer], attorney, and everything else.

SKORLINSKI: Ok. So you talked to her P.O. and attorney?

AVERY: Yeah.

SKORLINSKI: Who's her P.O.?

AVERY: Uh, Shannon somebody.

SKORLINSKI: Out of Manitowoc?

AVERY: Yeah.

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SKORLINSKI: And who's her attorney?

AVERY: Uh, Steve Wise, or something.

SKORLINSKI: Steve—

AVERY: Wise, from Madison..

SKORLINSKI: Steve Wise?

AVERY: Wase? I don't know, something like that.

SKORLINSKI: So you to them. You make any other phone calls on Monday afternoon?

AVERY: No, I think I called 'em once or twice.

SKORLINSKI: And, and why is that? Why are you talking to her, is it her attorney and her probation agent?

AVERY: Trying to get her out.

SKORLINSKI: Oh.

AVERY: And she's—the case is on appeal.

SKORLINSKI: Ok. How long does she have?

AVERY: Uh, she got nine months. She got three months left.

SKORLINSKI: And you want it sooner, you want her out sooner than that.

AVERY: Yeah! [Laughter.]

O'NEILL: Oh, I saw her picture I'd want her out too. [Avery Laughs.]

SKORLINSKI: Ok. And you don't remember any other calls, other than that? That's—

AVERY: Not offhand.

SKORLINSKI: Ok.

AVERY: You'd have to check the phone.

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SKORLINSKI: Did, did Teresa say anything to you about that she had to go to somebody else's house after your place?

AVERY: No.

SKORLINSKI: She didn't mention anything.

AVERY: No, she never, uh, tells me nothing.

SKORLINSKI: She doesn't say "oh," you know, like, "do you know so-and-so who lives down the road 'cause I gotta go shoot there, uh, shoot their car next to it?"

AVERY: No, no, no. No, it's mostly a "hi" and, you know, that's about it.

SKORLINSKI: Real short conversations.

AVERY: It's always she takes the picture, she writes down the serial number, and that's it.

SKORLINSKI: Then you pay?

AVERY: Yeah.

SKORLINSKI: And sometimes she gives a receipt.

AVERY: Yeah.

SKORLINSKI: Usually—

AVERY: Well, the last two times I didn't get nothin'. I ain't got no problems with them, and I've been doing it for I don't know a year, little more than a year. So I figure, well, like, why'd I need it?

SKORLINSKI: Do you know somebody George Zipper?

AVERY: George Zipper?

SKORLINSKI: Yeah.

AVERY: Uh-uh.

SKORLINSKI: She didn't drop—she didn't say that name at all or anything?

AVERY: No, no.

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SKORLINSKI: And, I don't know if, if you answered, umm, Tony's question— when was the last time you drove that front end loader? Was it last week?

AVERY: Yeah, I think I might've drove it. Put a car on the side.

SKORLINSKI: [To O'Neill] Can you grab that off of there? [To Avery] Show me, when you say put a car on the side, where did you put it?

AVERY: Uh, see here's the shop. So it'd been out of here and probably over here or, you know, back in here.

SKORLINSKI: Ok. This is the fenced in area—

AVERY: Yeah. This is the fenced in area.

SKORLINSKI: This stuff's not?

AVERY: No.

SKORLINSKI: But there's whole cars out here.

AVERY: Yeah. And there's cars here too.

SKORLINSKI: Ok.

AVERY: So, most time, you know, I drop it off here. Or sometimes they're newer and they go up here.

SKORLINSKI: When was the last time you drove the golf cart?

AVERY: Golf cart? Umm, Friday.

SKORLINSKI: Friday? And what did you drive that for?

AVERY: Ma don't like, like getting [unintelligible] by herself.

SKORLINSKI: That's definitely a reason.

AVERY: Yeah. [Laughter.]

SKORLINSKI: Now, on Thursday night, you saw tail lights. Can you show me on that diagram where the tail lights were?

AVERY: Well, they seemed like they were behind me. So, in here.

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SKORLINSKI: Is that a road?

AVERY: No, it's a hill.

SKORLINSKI: Ok. Is it—

AVERY: But you could drive on it.

SKORLINSKI: Ok. And they were behind your house.

AVERY: That's what it seemed like.

SKORLINSKI: And they were coming, which direction?

AVERY: The tail lights were back here. So they had to been going this way.

SKORLINSKI: Ok. And what is back there? I keep following those—

AVERY: It's all gravel pit. That's Radant's here, and that goes out behind us.

SKORLINSKI: So, is there an access road back there or something?

AVERY: Yeah, there's all—it's all open.

SKORLINSKI: It's open. So anybody could just drive on that.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Where'd they come in from?

AVERY: Radant's pit.

O'NEILL: Ok. Why don't you draw that back area of the pit. Kind of, like if you were to come in from the backside, draw us a diagram of how you would come in from the backside.

AVERY: That's 'Q'.

O'NEILL: Is that Highway Q?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Ok.

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AVERY: I don't know. Let's see. There's a side road here. Uh, it goes like this. It's all blacktopped. There's some houses here.

O'NEILL: Do you know who lives there? Just to give us some reference. I mean, do you know what the name of the road is?

AVERY: No, I can't remember what the name of the road is. But uh, Radant's pit is here. He's got, uh, all machinery and all gravel here. Then they got a, I don't know, there's a—where uh, a road goes back by us. Then you can go this way. Let's see, this would be us, in here. Then there's a conveyor here. But you can go underneath that conveyor, and get by us too, here. Or this way. This way's all blocked off, for what, it was for maybe a month or so. And then this is all open. So, you can go, go anywhere really.

O'NEILL: Ok. So what business is this?

AVERY: That's Radant's.

O'NEILL: Radant's?

AVERY: Yeah. Radant.

O'NEILL: Redon?

AVERY: Radant.

O'NEILL: Radant's Gravel?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: And you said this is a conveyor?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Like, uh, to transport gravel?

AVERY: Yeah. It's been there for quite a while.

O'NEILL: And this is a road, or is it your property?

AVERY: No, that's our property.

O'NEILL: So, a person could essentially go down County Q, down to Radant's Gravel, you say?

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AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: And then drive in through the back of Radant's Gravel?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Underneath the conveyor, and it brings them to a?

AVERY: To the back of the, uh, junkyard.

O'NEILL: And is that a gated thing, or fenced in thing, or blocked off road you said?

AVERY: No. It's just, they put a hill there, as a property line.

O'NEILL: Ok. So there's like a hill. So, to get through that hill, to get back into your property—

AVERY: Well, it only goes so far. Then there's, there's this open. The cars block—

O'NEILL: So you could—the cars are blocking the area there so to drive in you have to pass those cars.

AVERY: Yeah, otherwise we got a, we got a car there 'cause we used to get gravel from Radant.

O'NEILL: Uh-huh.

AVERY: And sometimes, we'd take that car out of the way, and put it back, you know, and—

O'NEILL: Just to block that road so you can't get in.

AVERY: Yeah. Yeah, but then the other side is all open. Or otherwise you can go up, you can go up on the hill—

O'NEILL: Uh-huh.

AVERY: I mean like, I'm back over here. And you can get through there and everything else. Or you take this road, and that uh, there's a field there. And you can drive the field.

O'NEILL: So some person would really have to know the area back here to get back into that back area, right?

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AVERY: I don't know.

O'NEILL: I mean I couldn't just think, "Ok I want to drive back into Avery property," and I mean, would I be able to poke my way back there—

AVERY: Yeah you'd have to—yeah.

O'NEILL: I probably wouldn't be able to do it, would I?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: I would?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Ok.

AVERY: Yeah, they got a, they caught quite a few people back there already.

O'NEILL: All right.

SKORLINSKI: You talk to the Sherriff's Department or whatever, trespassing?

AVERY: Well, yeah. Radant, and then he calls the cops, and—

SKORLINSKI: Well, and that's what we—you know, and that's what we're looking at. Because let's go back to that other, this map. Uh, what's, what direction is south on here?

AVERY: South would be on top, yeah.

O'NEILL: So, where's, where's north, down here?

AVERY: North would be here.

O'NEILL: So, if I were to draw an arrow, where's north, down here?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Ok.

SKORLINSKI: Now, do you know where her car was found?

AVERY: No.

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SKORLINSKI: Ok. It's on that south property line, by that bur, is that that little hill you're talking about? That hill you—

AVERY: By the pond?

SKORLINSKI: Uh, no, I think it's by the pit. There's, you just said there's a hill or something?

AVERY: Well there's uh, let's see. Now here's Chuckie. Uh, there's a road here that goes down in the pit.

SKORLINSKI: Mm-hmm.

AVERY: You know, and uh, there's a, a property line that is built up. And then it goes all the way this way.

SKORLINSKI: All right. Where are—

AVERY: And they all dug, that's all dug out.

SKORLINSKI: Ok. Where are the cars parked back there on that south side?

AVERY: They're all in here.

SKORLINSKI: Ok. And that's where, that's where her car was found.

AVERY: So anywhere in here?

SKORLINSKI: Mm-hmm.

O'NEILL: I asked you about describing what she was wearing that day. Do you remember at all, again? Did you think about that?

AVERY: I can't remember what she was wearing.

O'NEILL: Ok. And you didn't have any conversation with her other than—

AVERY: No. We never do.

O'NEILL: Did she ask you how much you wanted for your vehicle and stuff like that?

AVERY: No, no.

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O'NEILL: How does she get that information?

AVERY: Well, got it on a piece of paper.

O'NEILL: Who gave her a piece of paper?

AVERY: I did.

O'NEILL: Ok. You didn't tell me that yesterday. So, she's there, she's outside taking pictures, you said, right away.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: You go outside. what do you have with you that you're bringing to her?

AVERY: That's the piece of paper with the money. 'Cause, see the money's—put it in a piece of paper.

O'NEILL: And, and you did that.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Who wrote up the piece of paper?

AVERY: I did.

O'NEILL: Did you do it inside the house before she came?

AVERY: Oh that was done, I don't know, maybe Saturday.

O'NEILL: Who did that?

AVERY: I did that.

O'NEILL: Ok. what'd it say on this paper?

AVERY: Uh, "For Sale. 1989 Dodge Van. Make an Offer." And it had the phone numbers.

O'NEILL: Ok. And you had the money in there and everything else, you gave it to her?

AVERY: Yeah. I would have my—her number, and my cellphone number.

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O'NEILL: Ok. As far as what she was wearing, I mean, if you could just close your eyes and think about it, you know, could you think about what she was possibly wearing?

AVERY: I don't know.

O'NEILL: Ok. And then you gave her the money while she's getting you the book, or do you give it to her right away, or?

AVERY: I gave it to her right away.

O'NEILL: When she's taking the pictures.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: How do you get to the point of going from the van where she's taking the picture, to her vehicle for the book.

AVERY: I walk.

O'NEILL: She tell you that—you ask her for a book?

AVERY: No. She said, uh, "I got the book in the truck."

O'NEILL: Ok. And every time that she comes she gives you a book?

AVERY: Yeah, yeah.

O'NEILL: So then you follow her towards the truck?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: What happens next?

AVERY: well, she gives me the book.

O'NEILL: She opens the door up?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Ok. She get inside, or she just reach inside?

AVERY: No, she opened the door. she got in. Then she reached over.

O'NEILL: So she closed the door?

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AVERY: No.

O'NEILL: She leaves the door open.

AVERY: The door's open.

O'NEILL: She sit down inside?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: She reaches over to where to get the book?

AVERY: Yeah, the passenger side.

O'NEILL: And then she just hand it out to you?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Does she—then she, does she get back out of the truck again?

AVERY: No, no.

O'NEILL: Then she just leaves?

AVERY: Yeah. She shuts the door and leaves.

O'NEILL: Is, is Bobby home then, or no?

AVERY: Yeah, Bobby's home.

O'NEILL: Ok. And, does he come out and, or anything? Or does he see you leave, or see her leave?

AVERY: I don't know. You'd have to ask him.

O'NEILL: But you know he's home?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Ok. Well, so—

AVERY: He's home at that point.

O'NEILL: When she leaves, he's home?

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AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: And how far away from Bobby's vehicle are you, you think?

AVERY: Well, her—his vehicle was sitting by her garage. So that's only—

O'NEILL: Like from here to where? Where we're looking right here.

AVERY: Uh, from here?

O'NEILL: Yeah.

AVERY: Probably to the other side of the, the shop there.

O'NEILL: The other side of the blue shop?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: So probably about, that's about what, maybe, uh 80 feet? And, and you know he's home though, right?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: when she's leaving.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Ok.

AVERY: And just when I walked in the house, I come back and then he was gone.

O'NEILL: So just in that moment?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Of you, you saying goodbye to Teresa—

AVERY: Yeah, and went in the house.

O'NEILL: Go into your house with the paper, and coming back, you notice that he's gone.

AVERY: Yeah.

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O'NEILL: But while she's giving you that thing, he's still there?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: SO he—Ok.

AVERY: Within, I don't know, that second. With her vehicle running, and his is quiet.

O'NEILL: Uh-huh.

AVERY: He probably, at the same time, almost.

O'NEILL: Ok. So, but, the time that it took you to walk from her vehicle to your place, drop off that thing—

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: And then to walk right back outside again?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: He's gone.

AVERY: He's gone.

O'NEILL: Ok. Do you know where she's at?

AVERY: Who?

O'NEILL: Teresa.

AVERY: Oh, no.

O'NEILL: And did you have anything to do her at all, disappearing, or?

AVERY: No, no.

O'NEILL: Ok. And the only time that she's ever been to your house she'd just knock on the door.

AVERY: Yeah, that's it.

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O'NEILL: Tell us about that time. When was that? How long ago? 15 times that you've had contact with her. When do you think it was that she actually came to the door?

AVERY: How many times?

O'NEILL: The last time?

AVERY: Monday.

O'NEILL: She came to the door?

AVERY: No.

O'NEILL: Ok.

AVERY: I seen her. The last time she knocked at the door, oh that was probably for my car.

O'NEILL: How long ago would that had been.

AVERY: A week, two?

O'NEILL: Ok. But she never came inside?

AVERY: No.

O'NEILL: And, seeing that you remember about your car when she knocks on the door, what time of day was that, that she did that contact with you?

AVERY: Mmm, that was around three O'clock.

O'NEILL: So that was like, again, you called up and said "hey I have a vehicle to sell?"

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: And they came over that same day?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: You're at home.

AVERY: Well, I don't know if I had made it that Monday, I could had made it during the week.

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O'NEILL: Ok. So she came over, knocks on the door—

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: And, what happens?

AVERY: I got the money. I mostly got it all made out. It's on the bar, or by the computer.

O'NEILL: Ok.

AVERY: So that's all done, then I grab that then give it to her.

O'NEILL: Outside?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: And then, she give you another one of those books again?

AVERY: Yeah, she always does.

O'NEILL: Then she took pictures of your vehicle?

AVERY: Yeah. But that was about three o'clock because I called her, and then she called me back.

O'NEILL: Ok.

AVERY: On that one. 'Cause she was going to be running late so it'd be about three o'clock, she said.

O'NEILL: So if she runs late, she gives you a call.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: But she was never inside the house, that's the only time that she's knocked on the door that you recall. Or was there other times that she knocked on the door, too? Probably was?

AVERY: Yeah, there probably was. Maybe at first. I can't remember, that's so long ago.

O'NEILL: Yeah, and it's always been her?

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AVERY: Yeah. It's always been her.

O'NEILL: Ok.

SKORLINSKI: Did she call you on Monday, prior to coming over at two O'clock?

AVERY: Not this time, no. Last—

SKORLINSKI: Are you sure?

AVERY: Yeah.

SKORLINSKI: You sure she didn't call and say "I'm going to be early," or "I'm going to be late," or anything like that?

AVERY: No.

O'NEILL: Who's number is seven—

AVERY: That's my sister's.

O'NEILL: Would she had called her for any reason?

AVERY: That's the one whose the, the van is under.

O'NEILL: Is that Barb?

AVERY: Yeah. Yeah, the van is underneath her name.

O'NEILL: so the contact information on that sheet of paper you had for how much you want the van for and stuff, whose number was on there, listed?

AVERY: That was Barbara's and mine.

O'NEILL: So both of your numbers.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Ok.

AVERY: That's how we mostly do it.

SKORLINSKI: Ok. She called this number on Monday morning. Just before noon. Was—Barb wasn't home though, huh?

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AVERY: No, she was at work.

SKORLINSKI: Bobby would had been home, right?

AVERY: Yeah, yeah.

SKORLINSKI: You were not in your sister's house—

AVERY: No.

SKORLINSKI: At, at quarter to twelve.

AVERY: No.

SKORLINSKI: She never—Teresa never said, "oh, by the way I just called and talked to your nephew," or anything like that?

AVERY: No.

SKORLINSKI: She never said that.

AVERY: See. he works third shift.

SKORLINSKI: Ok.

AVERY: Sometimes he's sleeping, and sometimes he's up.

O'NEILL: About the receipt. You said, for the most part, up until at least two times, you always had gotten a receipt from her, right?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: This last time you didn't ask for a receipt?

AVERY: No. When I put my Pontiac in, I thought "I don't need no more of them." I said, "what for?"

O'NEILL: Ok.

AVERY: Uh, I got good service, with the truck.

O'NEILL: Mm-hmm.

AVERY: I trust them.

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O'NEILL: When she did write out a receipt, I mean, she, she'd have it to you right away, or?

AVERY: Yeah yeah.

O'NEILL: She got into her vehicle, or she—

AVERY: No, she had it done all the way.

O'NEILL: She had it done, beforehand.

AVERY: Yeah, yeah.

O'NEILL: So, when you—at the point up until you're selling your Pontiac, you always got a receipt from her. But then, with the Pontiac, you said, "hey, I don't need a receipt no more."

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: So you said "no more."

AVERY: I don't need no more.

O'NEILL: So then it comes Monday, she doesn't prepare a receipt for you at all?

AVERY: Oh, I don't know.

SKORLINSKI: She doesn't give you a receipt right?

AVERY: No, no.

SKORLINSKI: Ok.

AVERY: So, she must have it with her, or, or whatever.

SKORLINSKI: Ok.

AVERY: 'Cause I told her, "I don't need no more." What for?

O'NEILL: And then, like you told me, that your sister asked you if you'd give her the money, 'cause she didn't have it or what?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Ok.

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AVERY: She didn't have it to spare, so I said, "well that ain't no problem. I can handle that for now."

SKORLINSKI: [To O'Neill] I'm gonna jump out and make a phone call. Can you have him, uh, initial or sign and date those sheets that he drew then for us?

O'NEILL: [To Skorlinski] Sure.

AVERY: Sure.

SKORLINSKI: [To O'Neill] Ok. Thanks, I'll be a second.

O'NEILL: I'm gonna throw my initials on there. Throw yours on there. How's your dad doing, is he doing all right?

AVERY: Yeah, he's doing better. [Laughter.]

O'NEILL: How much did he have to drink last night?

AVERY: Pretty much! [Laughter.]

O'NEILL: Yeah?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Yeah. He's a nice guy though, I like him.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: He's probably seen a lot more accident scenes than I'd ever seen in my whole life, right?

AVERY: [Laughter.] Yeah.

O'NEILL: Do you ever—as a kid growing up, I mean, you and I are about the same age—I was born in '61, you were born in '62? So, we went through the 70s and 80s, eh?

AVERY: Yeah, that's where [those were] the good days.

O'NEILL: Yeah. So, God did like Dad always do towing then, for the—

AVERY: Yeah.

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O'NEILL: Sherriff's department and everybody else?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: So he come home with stories?

AVERY: But now we don't get nothing.

O'NEILL: Really?

AVERY: We haven't been getting none.

O'NEILL: Why not?

AVERY: Since I had that sexual assault with Penny Beersten.

O'NEILL: So, so that cut into the business?

AVERY: Oh yeah.

O'NEILL: That, that sucks.

AVERY: Well, they don't, they don't call Avery's no more. They call everybody else. You know, can have an accident right down the road and they'll call somebody else.

O'NEILL: Don't you say hey, "I'm—add us on the list?" I mean—

AVERY: Chuck and Earl, they complain all the time.

O'NEILL: And they won't put you on a list.

AVERY: Well they put us on a list. We get all the abandoned ones. But after them, we don't get either. We get the junk.

O'NEILL: Did you call them on it?

AVERY: Oh yeah, quite a few times.

O'NEILL: and they still ain't-

AVERY: No.

O'NEILL: That sucks.

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AVERY: I think they're out to get me.

O'NEILL: Well—

AVERY: I'm, with this other case with the lawsuit and everything else. I don't know.

O'NEILL: Mm-hmm. Well I guess, you, you know, you probably wonder yourself. But, you got to take and think about the factual things. I mean, someone actually goes through the problems and troubles to put her car on your property? You know? I mean I'm not from there. I have no allegiance to the idea of what Manitowoc County does. It's like, I'm trying to understand this, Steve. It's like, "wait, this is pretty wild."

AVERY: yeah, well when I talk to the TVs too, they don't understand it.

O'NEILL: I mean, you know we're not young guys that are just basically thinking about things that we might've saw on TV and try to apply it to real life. We got some experience in our back pocket, you know? Far as your relationship with your fiancé, it's a good relationship?

AVERY: Oh yeah.

O'NEILL: Yeah.

AVERY: Yeah, sometimes we argue over the phone, you know, when—

O'NEILL: Yeah.

AVERY: I did a lot of that too.

O'NEILL: Yeah?

AVERY: I did quite a bit of that at first.

O'NEILL: Arguing?

AVERY: Oh yeah.

O'NEILL: Yeah. You got a temper? You're not Irish, right?

AVERY: No. Well I got a little Irish in me.

O'NEILL: Me, I got a lot.

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AVERY: But since I've been out, you know I get, uh, I don't know, I talk loud once in a while, you know.

O'NEILL: Mm-hmm.

AVERY: But that's about it.

O'NEILL: Does she, she talk loud too or?

AVERY: Mmm, yeah all-especially when she was drinking.

O'NEILL: Yeah.

AVERY: That's how we got in that, that scrap. I just kind of pushed her on the couch, you know, to tell her to sit down. And that's why they arrested me, cause I touched her and just put her on the couch.

O'NEILL: how long ago was that?

AVERY: Mmm, over a year ago I think.

O'NEILL: And she's on probation, right?

AVERY: Now she is, yeah.

O'NEILL: What's she on probation for?

AVERY: For that drunken' driving.

O'NEILL: Is that the only issues that she has—

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Is drinking and driving?

AVERY: Yeah, yeah.

O'NEILL: She work?

AVERY: No.

O'NEILL: No? How'd you guys meet?

AVERY: Gas station. [Laughter.]

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O'NEILL: Really? Was she working or just—

AVERY: Yeah me and my sister—no she was just there.

O'NEILL: Uh-huh.

AVERY: And she had her car there.

O'NEILL: And just got talking and next thing you know you're hooked up, eh?

AVERY: Yep.

O'NEILL: That's pretty cool.

AVERY: But we had our, had our car and, I went with her. I drove her car, and then my sister went home. And we stopped for a soda, me and my sister's. I bought her a soda, said "I ain't coming, I'm going with her." So, then we came over by me. You know, I had to push my old Blazer and everything else 'cause I blew the motor up—

O'NEILL: Uh-huh.

AVERY: Then I smashed her front end a little bit, and, uh she was a little mad at me. You know, the first time I met her.

O'NEILL: Uh-huh.

AVERY: And I do all of this. Well I got that all done, you know we stayed there for a bit. I showed her the ice shack, what I was living in at first.

O'NEILL: Hmm.

AVERY: Then we went for a ride. Then it was foggy out. Then I put it in the ditch. Well, long story straight, she got, uh, accused for it because I took off. Had Barbara pick me up. And she went that way and, before I knew it, got arrested.

O'NEILL: So she took one for you, eh?

AVERY: Well, it ain't no—nothin' to put the car in the ditch, when it's foggy out.

O'NEILL: Mm-hmm.

AVERY: No, that's what she's fighting now.

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O'NEILL: Hmm. Hey, uh, they gonna find anything inside your place, if they look? Huh?

AVERY: They were already. I let 'em in it.

O'NEILL: I'm just asking.

AVERY: I let them in it already. I ain't got nothing to hide.

O'NEILL: Ok. What about the, uh, this girl's family? I mean, what—what'd you want to tell them?

AVERY: I wish they'd find her, or, I wish she'd show up.

O'NEILL: Mm-hmm.

AVERY: So we can know—see what really happened. Or why she'd go, or what. You know, because I know my family went through hell.

O'NEILL: Mm-hmm.

AVERY: I can figure what they went through. And when I was married to my wife, we went through a lot of stuff. I could figure how they are. It ain't not nice.

O'NEILL: So you were married before.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Is this before you went to prison?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Any kids?

AVERY: Five.

O'NEILL: Really? [Laughter.] You had five kids?

AVERY: Yep. Set of twins and that.

O'NEILL: No kidding.

AVERY: But I only see one, now. You know, the rest of them they don't want nothing to do with me.

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O'NEILL: How old's your oldest?

AVERY: Uh, now you want me to do math? [Laughter.]

O'NEILL: No, just roughly.

AVERY: 21-22.

O'NEILL: Ah, you're like me. [Laughter.] Yeah. Wow. So then, of course, from what went on back then, I imagine it worked on your relationship with your kids—

AVERY: Oh yeah.

O'NEILL: And wife, and family, eh?

AVERY: Yeah, yeah.

O'NEILL: Is that what basically broke you guys up?

AVERY: Mostly, yeah.

O'NEILL: Yeah?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Do the kids live around at all, or no?

AVERY: Yeah, they're—three of 'em are around.

O'NEILL: Yeah.

AVERY: And the other two are, in the army or whatever it is.

O'NEILL: Really? You had twins, eh?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Twin boys?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: No kidding.

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AVERY: That's the ones that're in there. Well they were getting in trouble and everything else and—

O'NEILL: Uh-huh.

AVERY: I guess they had to do something.

O'NEILL: Wow. Boy.

AVERY: I just wish all of this shit was over already.

O'NEILL: Well you have to admit, you know, take a step back and take a look at it, it's kind of—

AVERY: Yeah, look at it. The goddamn vehicle's there. It's been found and it ain't gonna happen again.

O'NEILL: Yeah.

AVERY: There'll be a fence up around it.

O'NEILL: But yeah, you, you know it's easy for me to say because I'm not you. But if you try to disassociate yourself from it and take a step back and say "Ok, let's say I'm not me for a moment, I'm looking at this big picture. What do I think?" You know? It's hard to do—

AVERY: It is.

O'NEILL: But, if you can, take a step back and take a look at it and say "God," you know what's—

AVERY: Yeah and see which way you'd go.

O'NEILL: You know? Now, of course, you have an image. You know what I'm saying? And the idea of saying, "hey, uh, I'm Steve Avery. This is what I'm all about and this is what I'm not all about." You know? This family, of course, is looking at, "God," you know, "the last person that she'd seen was Steven Avery." You know. "Is he being truthful to this matter? Is he being helpful to this matter and," you know, "is he being sympathetic to our needs?" Right? So, you know, I mean you're talking to us. You're telling us exactly what we need to know as far as her last, uh, being there. And, uh, hopefully you know next week we're all talking about the idea that this is, you know, we found her, you know? Hopefully she's safe.

AVERY: I hope so.

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O'NEILL: Yeah.

AVERY: One for my sake, but for her family's sake.

O'NEILL: Mm-hmm.

AVERY: 'Cause I know how it feels. My other kids don't want nothing to do with me. And that's almost the same thing, I don't see 'em.

O'NEILL: When you had your other thing, you know? Did you offer to do anything like take a polygraph or anything like that, or? Did you take one? What happened?

AVERY: I passed it.

O'NEILL: You passed your polygraph? So you're pretty comfortable with, back then, taking a polygraph to show that you were being truthful?

AVERY: They don't do shit though, that's the only thing.

O'NEILL: What do you mean?

AVERY: They aren't reliable. Uh—

O'NEILL: Who who, who offered you the polygraph back then? Law enforcement or your attorney, or?

AVERY: My attorney from Milwaukee.

O'NEILL: And you passed it. This is when you were already in prison, or?

AVERY: Yeah, I was in Green Bay.

O'NEILL: How long were you in prison for, then?

AVERY: A couple years, I think.

O'NEILL: And law enforcement never offered you a polygraph?

AVERY: No, I set one up.

O'NEILL: Mm-hmm.

AVERY: In Manitowoc when I was there.

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O'NEILL: Mm-hmm.

AVERY: But then, uh, got uh, my attorney canceled it.

O'NEILL: Mm-hmm. So they—the law enforcement if they actually would've done a polygraph back then may have found you to be not deceptive. To be truthful about this whole thing, and worked out from there, eh?

AVERY: My opinion?

O'NEILL: Yeah.

AVERY: Eh, from Manitowoc? I don't know. I ain't got too much faith in Manitowoc.

O'NEILL: Hmm. But back then though, you weren't colored by that—

AVERY: No. Well that's why I wanted to set it up.

O'NEILL: Right.

AVERY: You know?

O'NEILL: But now—

AVERY: I said I'd give it a shot.

O'NEILL: But now, it's a whole different story. I mean you [unintelligible]—

AVERY: Well yeah, it's all different. You know?

O'NEILL: Right. Huh. You spent a lot of good time of your life in prison.

AVERY: Yeah. Something I shouldn't have.

O'NEILL: Yeah. You should be upset.

AVERY: But now, now I got all of this. I'm trying to stay calm and handle it the right way.

O'NEILL: Uh-huh.

AVERY: You know?

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O'NEILL: I worked on a missing person's case last year. A 40-some year old guy from up in this area. Actually probably 50-some. I don't know if you saw that last September it was. The guy ended up bringing his, uh, daughter-in-law for a ride down to Chicago. She had to take a flight down to Arizona and no one seen or heard from her after that. She ended up, uh, being in Iowa. You know, like two months later. [Laughter.] But, you know, people are really different. You guys brought that little truck up from the—

AVERY: Well my Dad bought that a long time ago.

O'NEILL: Yeah?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: That must've been fun to run around in.

AVERY: Yeah, it is.

O'NEILL: Hmm.

AVERY: He's got one at home, my Dad, we just took home.

O'NEILL: Yeah?

AVERY: Yeah, it's gotta be fixed a little bit.

O'NEILL: How many cars you think you guys got down in the yard?

AVERY: I don't know. A couple thousand.

O'NEILL: Really? How old do you think the oldest one is?

AVERY: I don't know. In the 40s maybe.

O'NEILL: You still got some from the 40s and 50s? A lot of collect—do you guys go on the network of—

AVERY: No.

O'NEILL: No? Because isn't that a big deal now where you can go on network and list your cars as a—and, and to other salvage operators and all that stuff?

AVERY: Yeah. But we didn't even get that far yet.

O'NEILL: No?

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AVERY: We're just starting to get up there now.

O'NEILL: 'Cause that's a really good business.

AVERY: Yeah. I don't know about anymore, heh.

O'NEILL: Yeah, so Earl and Chuck are basically the people that run the business now?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Yeah.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: And does that go with the market like as far as metal? Metal changes every day as far as how much the scrap metal and things?

AVERY: Mmm, nah. They ain't too much in, in there.

O'NEILL: No?

AVERY: Just when they get enough, then they get rid of it.

O'NEILL: Hmm.

AVERY: Yeah, I guess they just kind of sell so much at one time. And, you know with the taxes and the insurance, and—

O'NEILL: Yeah, but it's a family affair, eh?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: So, is Bobby, you said works midnights, where does he work?

AVERY: Hamilton's.

O'NEILL: Furniture?

AVERY: Uh, I think the one on Memorial Drive, I think.

O'NEILL: Hmm.

AVERY: Whatever it is.

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O'NEILL: You do any fishing and stuff too, or no?

AVERY: I haven't been doing that lately.

O'NEILL: No? Where—do you usually go fishing?

AVERY: I used to, when I came out, at first.

O'NEILL: Yeah, on the lake?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Yeah. What do you think of that break wall at Manitowoc?

AVERY: The what?

O'NEILL: The break wall going to the lake. How it's been redone to the new break wall there.

AVERY: Oh, yeah it looks, it looks nice.

O'NEILL: Yeah, it is nice. I remember spending a real hot day down there once. I used to work for the DNR a long time ago. Sat down there, work and fisherman. But I used to like Manitowoc. I used to like Two Rivers a lot. Used to do a lot of drinking when I was down in Two Rivers going bar-to-bar in the winter time. [Avery laughs.] The Shed? I don't know if you remember Memorial Drive, the mall, remember all the strip bars there?

AVERY: Yeah?

O'NEILL: Used to have a bar there called East 40?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: I don't know if you remember that or not.

AVERY: Yeah, I remember that.

O'NEILL: Yeah, and then uh, what was it uh, Godfather's or Goodfellows? Downtown Manitowoc. Capone's?

O'NEILL: Yeah.

AVERY: I don't know.

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O'NEILL: But the Linebacker? That's still around, isn't it?

AVERY: I don't know.

O'NEILL: Yeah. And I told you about Fatzo's Subs?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Yeah, that place was pretty good. So, you been getting a lot of phone calls and stuff from the press?

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: How've they been?

AVERY: I guess pretty decent.

O'NEILL: Yeah.

AVERY: But you can't tell 'em much, just what you know.

O'NEILL: Yeah, exactly.

SKORLINSKI: [Enters vehicle.] Sorry about that.

AVERY: That's Ok.

O'NEILL: Ah, we were just shooting the breeze.

SKORLINSKI: You know what would help us out? If you would write out a statement as to the events of Monday, Tuesday. Umm, think you could do that?

AVERY: Well, I think I gave enough.

SKORLINSKI: Ok.

AVERY: You know? And my lawyers, I don't know if they'd go for that.

SKORLINSKI: Ok.

AVERY: You'd have to talk to them.

O'NEILL: Any more questions?

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SKORLINSKI: I think we've—I think we covered, did I miss anything? Covered everything.

O'NEILL: Do you have any questions?

AVERY: Wish it was over already!

O'NEILL: Well we talked about that.

AVERY: Heh.

SKORLINSKI: There's going to be, down the line, there's going to be some things that you know we're going to have to ask of you again, probably. So, we want to, we want to make sure—I mean, uh, her car's found on your family's property there. And that's very much a concern of ours, so.

AVERY: Oh yeah.

SKORLINSKI: You're going to have to bear with us a little bit.

AVERY: I can do that.

SKORLINSKI: Hopefully we'll have your, you know, continued cooperation here.

AVERY: Yes, you do.

O'NEILL: And sometimes there's things that are going on that we don't control, OK? So, in the idea that if something comes up and you say "God, that Tony O'Neill or that Kim Skorlinski," you know. I want you to understand something. This picture's a lot bigger than both of us, all right?

AVERY: Oh no, I know.

O'NEILL: So a lot of times our bosses are basically directing and orchestrating what's being done. Don't take it and put it towards us in the idea that we're the ones that are controlling that part of it. OK? I want you to understand something. When I came here the first day and said to you, "hey, look it, I have no intentions of placing you under arrest or taking you to custody or nothing like that, I just want to talk to you about this missing person?" I'm up front Steve, OK? If I'm going to arrest you or take you into custody, I'm going to tell you that. I'm not going to lie to you.

AVERY: Oh yeah.

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O'NEILL: So, as far as any distrust or anything like you may have with other officers in Manitowoc, I'd given you my word that if I'm going to do something with you, I'm going to tell you up front. And I'll make that promise to you.

AVERY: Ok.

O'NEILL: All right? 'Cause I gain nothing out of anything. I don't get no extra toaster at the end of [unintelligible]—

AVERY: [Laughter.] No, I don't think so.

O'NEILL: OK? So, even this same way, let's keep it open. You have questions and you're saying "boy," you know, "he said this, but I wonder what he meant by that," you know? Give me a call. I check my voicemail. Steve calls me up and says, "hey I just, uh, I have a question about this." I'll give you a call and say "hey Steve, here's the story." I'm not going to lie to you. I'm not going to make any promises to you. I'm not going to do anything that you're going say to yourself "boy, that O'Neill screwed me over." I won't do that. You've been through enough of that.

AVERY: Yeah.

O'NEILL: Is that a deal?

AVERY: That's a deal.

O'NEILL: All right. Anything else, Kim?

SKORLINSKI: Well, I was going to ask him, you know, if umm, if you, if—you know I think you've indicated that anybody could have access to the back of that yard. And, and could have put that car there. And, you know, we want to make sure that we're covering all the bases. Who, do you think could have done that? Who would be out to get you, Steve?

AVERY: The truth?

SKORLINSKI: Yeah.

AVERY: Manitowoc County.

SKORLINSKI: The Sherriff's Department?

AVERY: Kocourek.

SKORLINSKI: What's his name?

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AVERY: Kocourek.

SKORLINSKI: Kocourek? And that's something that he could do?

AVERY: Oh yeah.

SKORLINSKI: Anyone else? Say it's not law enforcement.

AVERY: I get along with everybody.

SKORLINSKI: That's what, that's what I'm asking. Do you have any, do you have any known enemies? Since you've been out, no problems, no disputes, umm. No conflicts, no fights or anything with anybody?

AVERY: No. No, I get along—

SKORLINSKI: No threats?

AVERY: Mm-mmm. Everybody calls me, they're all nice and I don't think I have one, one bad mark. Not even when I walk in the stores or whatever.

SKORLINSKI: Ok. So, nobody comes to mind other than, other than this deputy? Who would try and do this to you.

AVERY: Yeah, just the—that sheriff.

SKORLINSKI: Ok.

AVERY: That's all I can think of.

O'NEILL: And a lot of times, in dealing with cases like this. And the family's important. And we'd do this for your family as well as any other family. They're going to ask us questions. They're going to say "Ok. How's Mr. Avery? Has he been this way? Has he been that way? How can we trust him?" OK? "Is he being truthful?" And of course you know the question's going to be is "how, how do you know he's telling the truth?" OK? We talked about polygraph. To validate you being truthful, OK? Understanding that, if we use polygraph and it shows you deceptive, we can't use it anyhow. But, to tell this family that Steve Avery volunteered to take a polygraph and he was truthful, and we're going to hold you up as being truthful and say "we validated Steve Avery and everything that he's told us. And he's been truthful to us." You know how that family would accept that? Really well. OK? Because not only are they saying we believe in him, we're going to validate him being truthful. That's an option that we have, Steve. I would take advantage of it. Although you weren't given that opportunity back

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then, this is a good opportunity to hold yourself up again and say "hey, I'm being truthful to this matter." For this family, and validating yourself being a truthful person so we can move on to this whole deal about possibly someone else being involved in this. To finalize everything that we've talked about. We want to be able to say we validate you being truthful about this whole thing. Would you take a polygraph exam? It'd take about two-and-a-half, three hours. And I'll tell you what, you know who the polygraph examiner is?

AVERY: Who?

O'NEILL: Me. I made you a promise already, didn't I? There's no fear from me.

AVERY: I can talk to a lawyer and see what he thinks.

O'NEILL: Ok.

AVERY: But I got no problem with it.

O'NEILL: Ok. Because I think you need to. I think you need to show this family that you're being a hundred percent cooperative, hundred percent truthful. And I want to stand behind you and say, "no matter what you have heard about Steve Avery, no matter what's going on with this whole situation, I'll tell you what. If he was given this opportunity way back when, it probably would had cleared him just as well as it did today." That's what I want to be able to do. But you need to take that step. All right?

AVERY: Ok.

O'NEILL: We done?

SKORLINSKI: Yep.

O'NEILL: Ok. Take care.

AVERY: I'll talk to the lawyer.

AVERY: Yeah, I got no problem with it.

O'NEILL: Ok. No cost to you. Two-and-a-half hours right in Marinette. You call me. In fact, I'll give you my cellphone number, I'll give you my card.

AVERY: Think I got two—

O'NEILL: You got two!

AVERY: Two of 'em. [Laughter.]

O'NEILL: How'd you rate? Ok.

AVERY: All right.

SKORLINSKI: We'll be here for a little while yet. But that's Ok, go take your phone call.

AVERY: Yeah, that's—yeah.

O'NEILL: Thanks.

AVERY: Ok. Thanks.

SUPPLEMENTAL AFFIDAVIT OF LARRY BLUM, MD

Now comes your affiant, Larry Blum, MD, and under oath hereby states as follows:

1. I am of legal majority and can truthfully and competently testify to the matters contained herein based upon my personal knowledge. The factual statements herein are true and correct to the best of my knowledge, information and belief. I am of sound mind and I am not taking any medication nor have I ingested any alcohol that would impair my memory of the facts stated in this affidavit.

2. I am a board certified forensic pathologist, clinical pathologist, and anatomic pathologist. I have performed thousands of autopsies and have been qualified as an expert in forensic pathology in hundreds of criminal trials. (A copy of my CV is attached and incorporated as **Exhibit A** to this affidavit).

3. In my capacity as a forensic pathologist, I am asked to interpret injury patterns to determine whether the theory of a crime is consistent with the injuries observed during the autopsy of the victim and on the suspect. To that end, I am able to determine with a high level of accuracy how and when the injuries were inflicted, e.g., what instrument caused an injury, the relative positions of the victim and the



attacker at the time of the injury, and how long it has been since an injury was inflicted based upon how much it has healed.

4. I have examined the photos of Bobby Dassey's back taken on November 9, 2005, at Aurora Health Center. (The photos are attached and incorporated as **Exhibit B** to this affidavit). I have also reviewed Bobby Dassey's explanation for these scratches, *i.e.*, that they were caused by his Labrador puppy.

5. It is my opinion, to a reasonably degree of medical certainty and based upon my experience as a forensic pathologist, that the scratches on Bobby Dassey's back are inconsistent with scratches caused by a dog's paw. Instead, it is my opinion that the scratches on Bobby Dassey's back are more consistent with being caused by human fingernails.

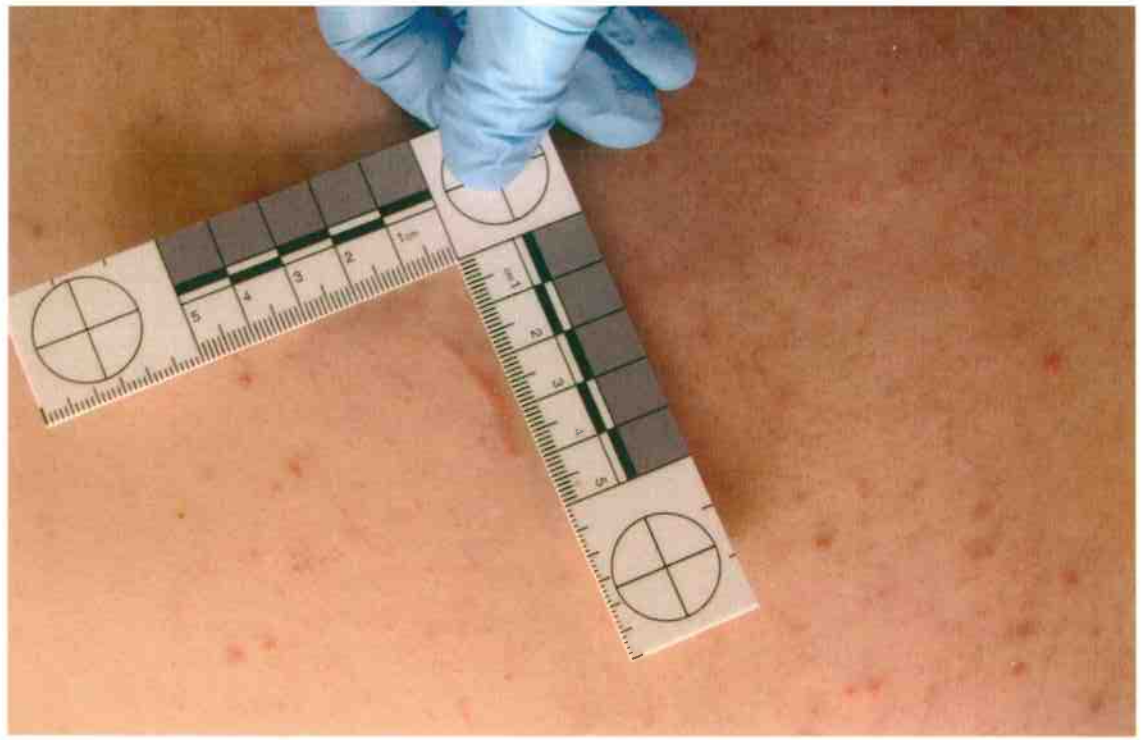


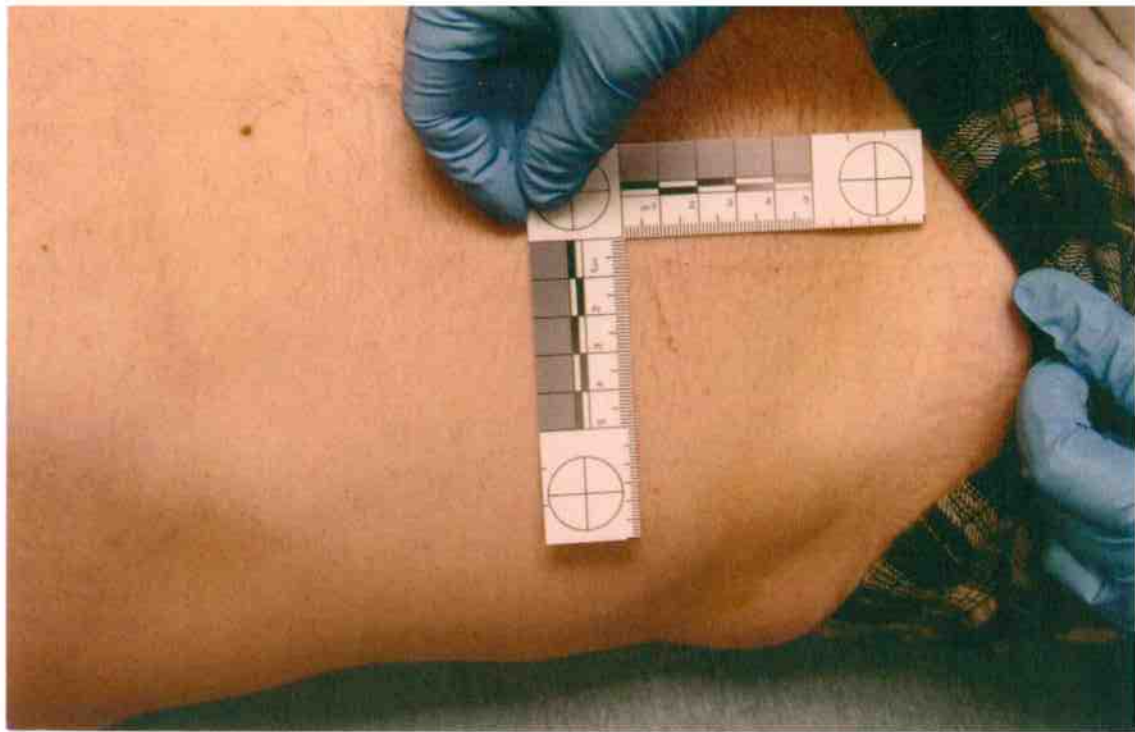


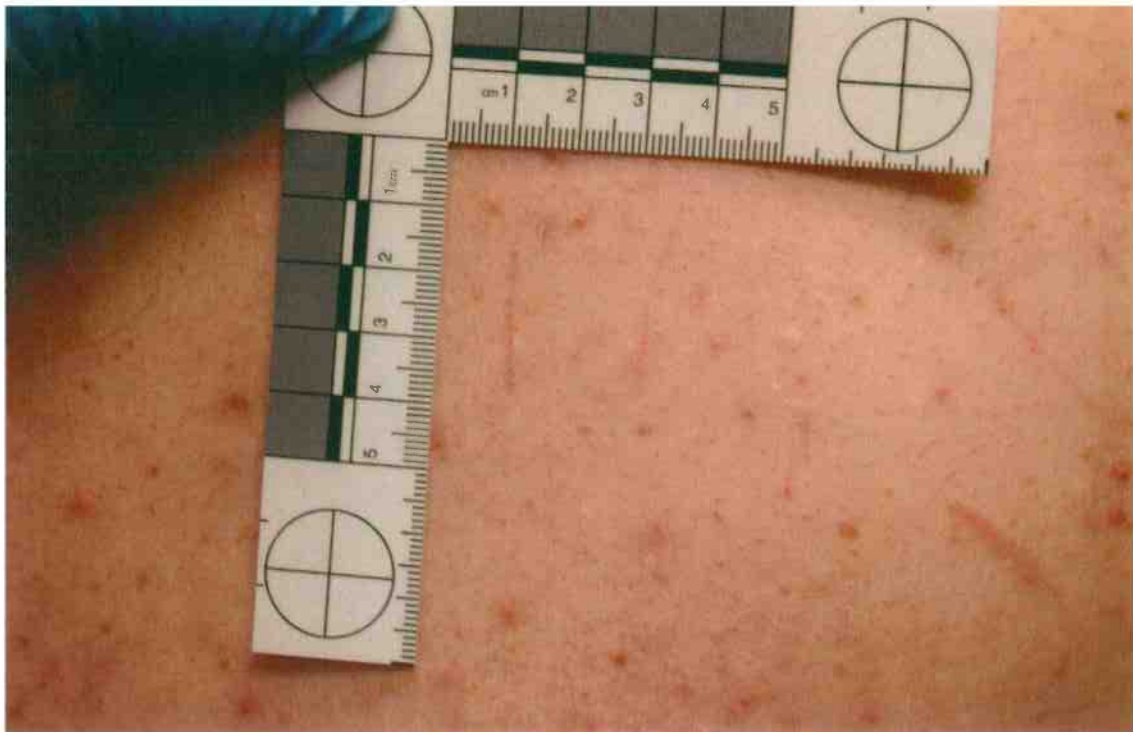

AFFIDAVIT OF BLAINE DASSEY

Now comes your affiant, Blaine Dassey, and under oath hereby states as follows:

1. I am of legal majority and can truthfully and competently testify to the matters contained herein based upon my personal knowledge. The factual statements herein are true and correct to the best of my knowledge, information and belief. I am of sound mind and I am not taking any medication, nor have I ingested any alcohol that would impair my memory of the facts stated in this affidavit.

2. In October 2005, I lived with my mother and brothers at 12930A Avery Road, Two Rivers, WI 54241. My brothers' names are Brendan, Bryan, and Bobby Dassey. Brendan and I shared a bedroom. Bobby had his own bedroom. Bryan kept some clothes at the house but lived with his girlfriend and was rarely at the residence. Tom Janda had moved out of the residence in early 2005.

3. When none of us were home, the residence was always locked.



4. My uncle Steven Avery ("Uncle Steven") only came to the residence when my mother and his sister Barb was home. I never remember my uncle Steven entering the residence when my mother was not home.

5. I remember that my Uncle Steven had cut his finger 1-2 weeks before October 31, 2005.

6. I remember, on October 31, 2005, seeing my Uncle Steven carry a white plastic bag to his burn barrel. I did not see a fire in the burn barrel. However, the police pressured me into saying that there was a fire in the burn barrel and visible smoke coming from the burn barrel. My testimony about the fire and smoke coming from the burn barrel was not true.

7. I remember, on October 31, 2005, seeing a bonfire behind my Uncle Steven's garage that was about 3-feet high. The police tried to pressure me into saying that the flames of the bonfire were much higher, so at trial I testified that the flames of the bonfire were 4-5 feet high but that testimony was not true. The police put the height of the flames "in my head and I agreed to it."

8. On October 31, 2005, I was with Brendan up until I left to go trick-or-treating. I distinctly remember Brendan wanted to use the computer at slightly before 5 p.m. because I wanted to make a phone call and his use of the dial-up internet computer would have prevented me from doing that. I know that Brendan was not at Uncle Steven's trailer up until I left to go trick-or-treating.

9. There was only one computer at the residence and it was always in Bobby's room sitting near a desk.

10. The computer had a password.
11. The computer had an AOL dial-up internet connection.
12. Bobby was the primary user of the computer.
13. At no time did I ever do searches for pornographic images or words related to pornography, words related to violence, words related to death, words related to mutilations, words related to torture, words related to guns or knives, words related to Teresa Halbach, words related to Steven Avery, words related to DNA, or words related to dead, mutilated or dismembered female bodies.
14. At no time did I ever create a folder for Teresa Halbach, my Uncle Steven, DNA, or news stories on the murder.
15. The only time I used the computer was to do my homework and occasionally send instant messages.
16. I remember my mother Barb hiring someone to "reformat the computer" but I'm not sure who that person was.
17. I do not have any personal knowledge of who made the appointment with AutoTrader to have my mother's van photographed but I did help clean the van so that it could be sold.
18. At the time, my family had two burn barrels located behind our house.
19. I was familiar with the gravel pits to the south of the Avery salvage yard but I did not go to the gravel pits to hunt. I stopped hunting when I was 22.
20. On October 31, 2005 when the school bus driver brought Brendan and me home as we travelled west on STH 147 I saw Bobby on STH 147 in a bluish or

greenish vehicle heading towards Mishicot. Bobby was not driving his black Blazer. Bobby was not home the rest of the evening while I was home. (Attached and incorporated herein as **Exhibit A** is a map that of the location of Bobby's vehicle that I described in this paragraph.)
